




INTRODUCTION


destiny.





The Graduates

Through the passage of time, the original number of the class of 1957 decreased from fifty-seven in the freshman year, to twenty-one as Seniors. Time, and the preference at Padua for quality, rather than quantity, brought about this rather large decrease. Of this small group of twenty-one, however, ten are considering the priesthood, and at least eight have serious intentions of entering college with careers in journalism, engineering, law, and medicine in mind.


In September, 1953, Father Humphrey Tobias, O.F.M., assumed the duties of adviser for the new Freshman class. Under his guidance and advice, St. Paschal Baylon was chosen as the class patron. Gold and white were decided upon as the class colors, while the red carnation became the class flower. "Nihil Prater Jesum Desideramus", i.e. "Nothing But Jesus Do We Desire," was chosen as the class motto.

Father Humphrey continued to guide the class for three years and part of the fourth, until he left Padua to undertake duties as a missionary in the Philippine Islands. Upon his departure, Father Christopher Konkol, O.F.M., acted as adviser for the remainder of the Senior year. It was during this ten-month period that they realized the duties expected of those entering adulthood. They experienced the burden of responsibilities, and began to learn the value of dependability. They became aware of the necessity of striving for success in life, both in the physical and spiritual world. After four years as adolescents, they readied themselves to face the world as adults.









Farewell








The most striking part of the altar is the Crucifix suspended above the altar. The Cross once ruled over Calvary; the Cross still rules over Calvary present in our churches. Every time the sacrifice of the Mass is repeated, Our Lord Himself, in the person of the priest, repeats the sacrifice of Calvary, offers God the Father His very own Body and Blood.





Sodality







Choristers


Following a relatively inactive season of singing last year, Padua's choristers set out to promote a more active program this year.







The varsity quintet began the season as a relatively inexperienced team with only one returning letterman. Prospects did not look bright, and a poor season was being forecast. But after a poor start, in which six of the first seven games were lost, the team began to find its own. The season ended with a 9–9 record.

Inadequate defensive work seemed to be the major problem at the beginning of the season. A unique four man zone with one man roaming was devised. This apparently solved the defensive difficulties. Meanwhile, a fast and smooth offensive attack was developed.

Coached by Mr. Wendland, the team was undoubtedly one of the faster in the area. They were especially successful on large courts on which they could execute the fast break more easily. Lack of height and depth, however, put them at a disadvantage against the taller and more experienced teams.





Padua continued its progress in interscholastic competition in oratory, as winners of school contests made conspicuous showings with outside contestants.






Unseasonal spring weather restricted almost all of the pre-season practice to the indoors, depriving the inexperienced players the much needed game situation practice.










Intramural Sports

Soccer initiated Padua's intramural program and was widely accepted by the boys. Since there was so much enthusiasm, a heated race for top honors developed. After the first four games it boiled down to a three team race between Zgodzinski, Jabubowski and Kaminski. Kaminski, emerged as victor in the thirteen team field.

Inclement weather put an abrupt end to football intramurals, although each team was able to see action twice. The boys were divided into two leagues of six six-man teams in this touch tackle program. The games were held after school until the Thanksgiving recess, when snow and rain impeded further competition.

A record total of 135 contestants participated in the five intramural basketball leagues. Heated races developed in all the leagues as none of the championships was decided until the final games.








Explorer Post 160


















An extended schedule of tumbling highlighted the formal physical education classes and gave the Padua students, a wellrounded program.


