
#### REV. ALBIN MIKLASZEWSKI, OFM




#### REV. DOMINIC TURAJSKI, ofm

#### REV. XAVIER WILK, OFM




**PRESIDENT**


VICE PRESIDENT


SECRETARY


TREASURER







Although he only scored 83 pts. this season, his fight and spirit were a constant aid to the club. John is a persistent ball hawk, who usually manages a few steals every game—and an equal number of intercepted passes.




## GYMNASTICS TEAM





#### NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

A strong Christian character as well as following the rule of St. Francis was maintained and practiced by the members of the Third Order.

Once again, this group proved itself to be an active society. They sponsored the yearly drive for clothing and useful items for the Philippine Missions, and also advocated the necessity of aiding the missions spiritually as well as materially.
