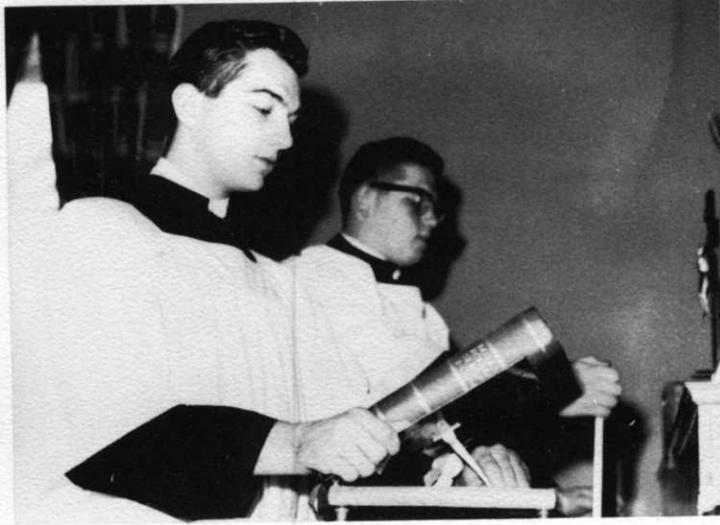

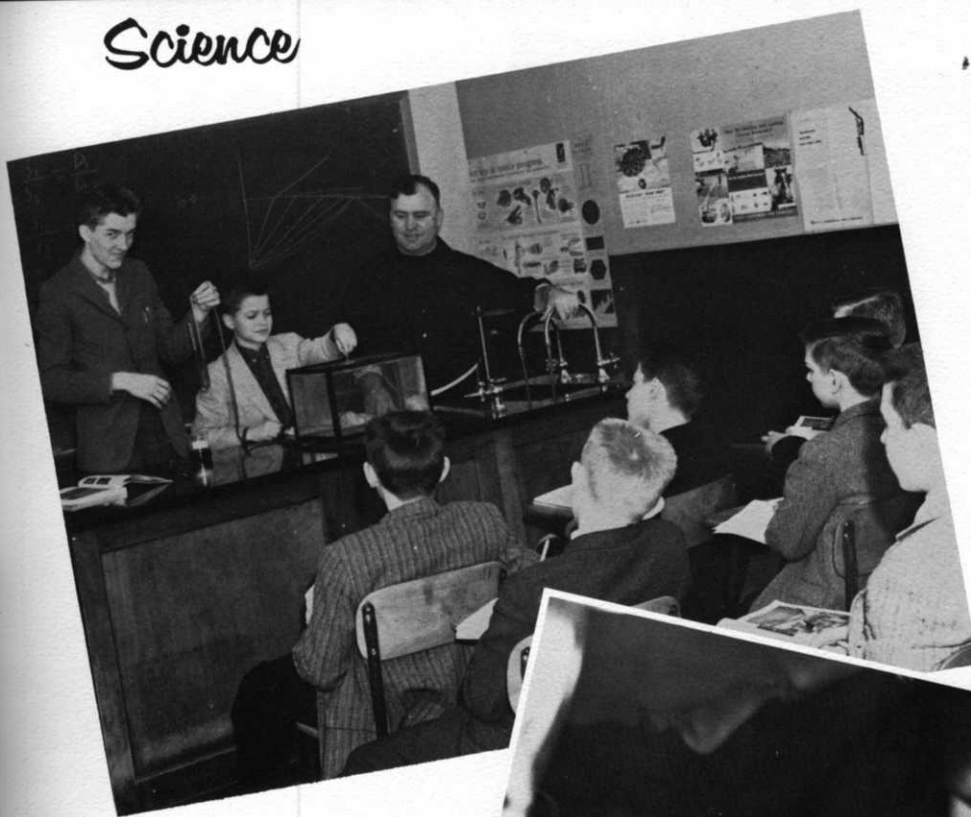

Scholarship . . . Character . . . Leadership . . . Service . . .

. . . these are the criteria by which the faculty judges a student worthy to wear the emblem of the N.H.S.

The Scholarship standard is an 85% average. Upon qualifying with this average the candidate is examined for sound moral principles. He must be average in intelligence, but outstanding in character, a shining example to his fellow classmen.

An eager helping hand is the third thing for which the faculty looks. Does this student perform voluntary services for the good of the school?

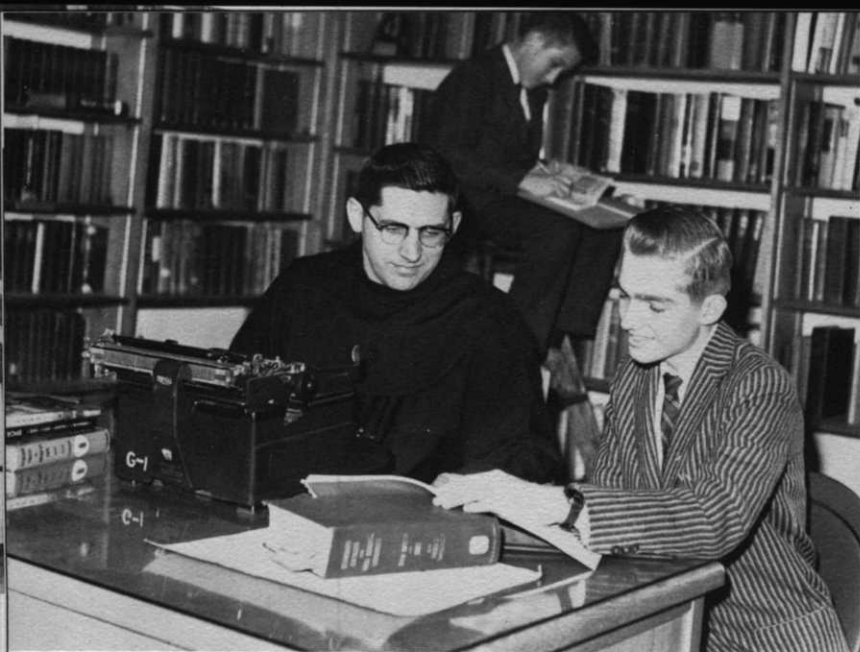
Lastly is Leadership. Although not such a strong point for acceptance, the candidate must be able to stand on his own two feet.

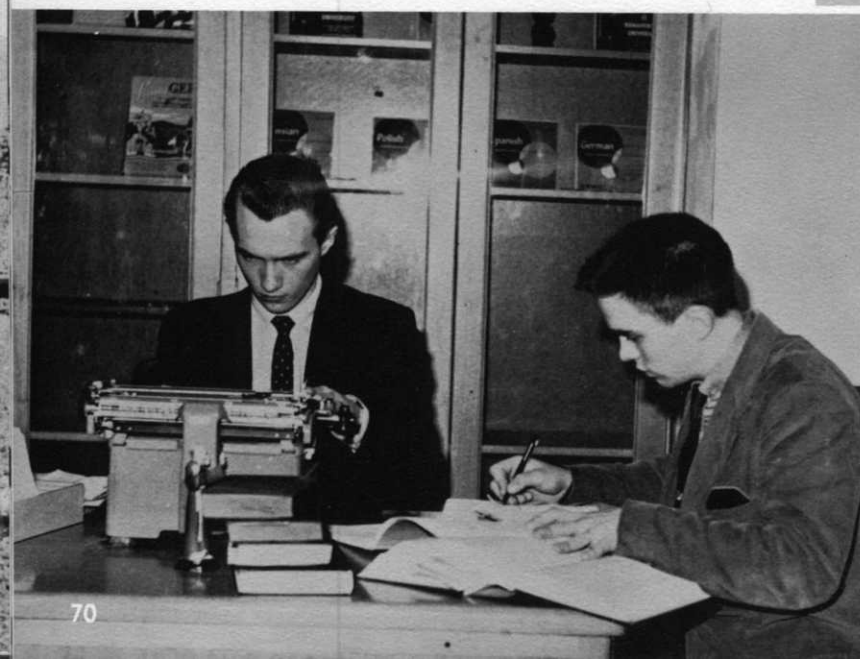
