
# Rector's Message


The school concerns itself not just with the advancement of learning but with the advancement of character. It does so through its Guidance system.


The Seniors copped cross country laurels with the low of 33 points. Sophomores placed second with 44, Juniors third with 96 and Frosh last with 104.

An eager helping hand is the third thing for which the faculty looks. Does this student perform voluntary services for the good of the school?


Lastly is Leadership. Although not such a strong point for acceptance, the candidate must be able to stand on his own two feet.
