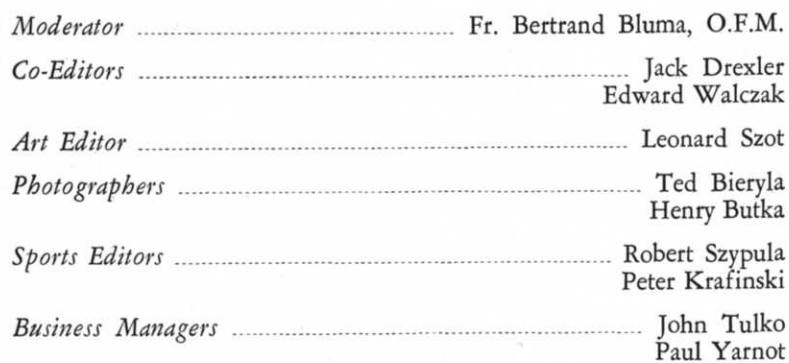

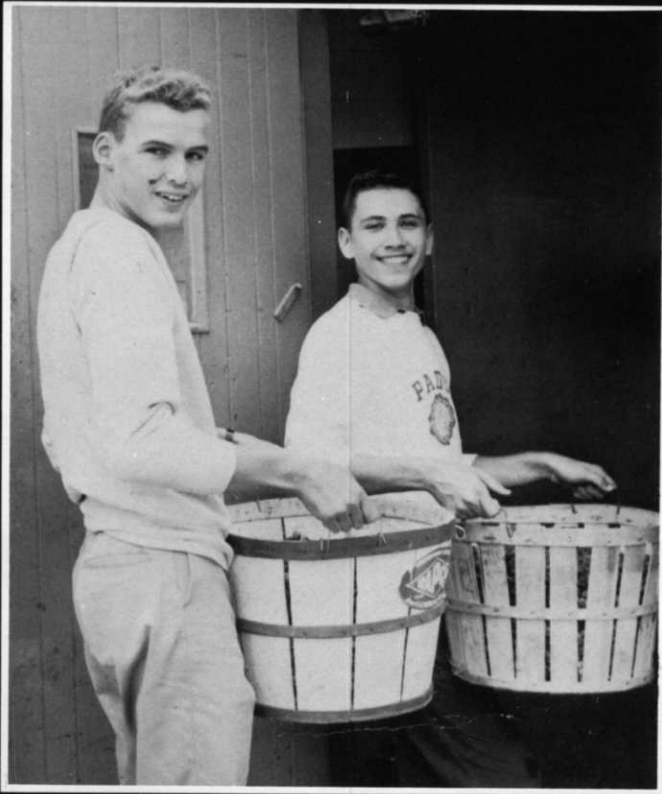
Foreword

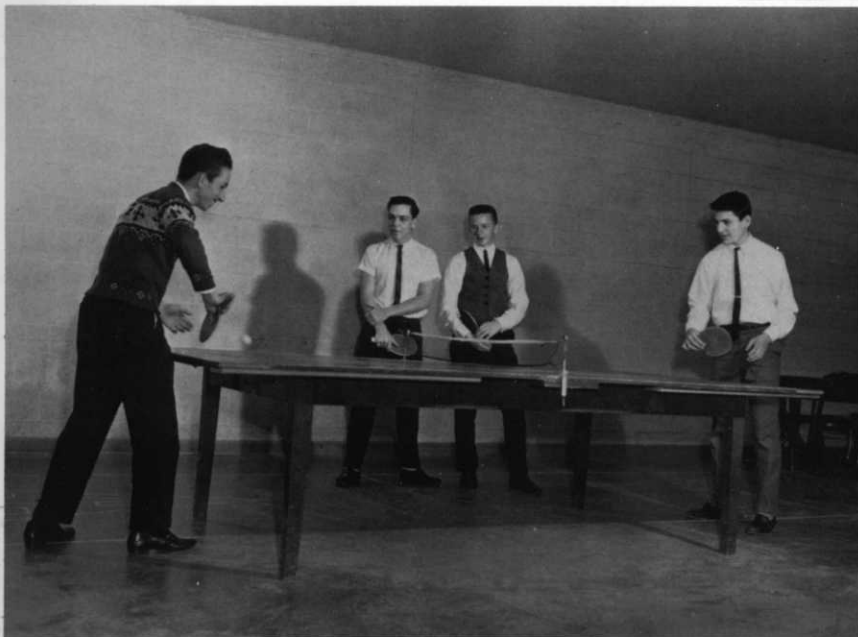

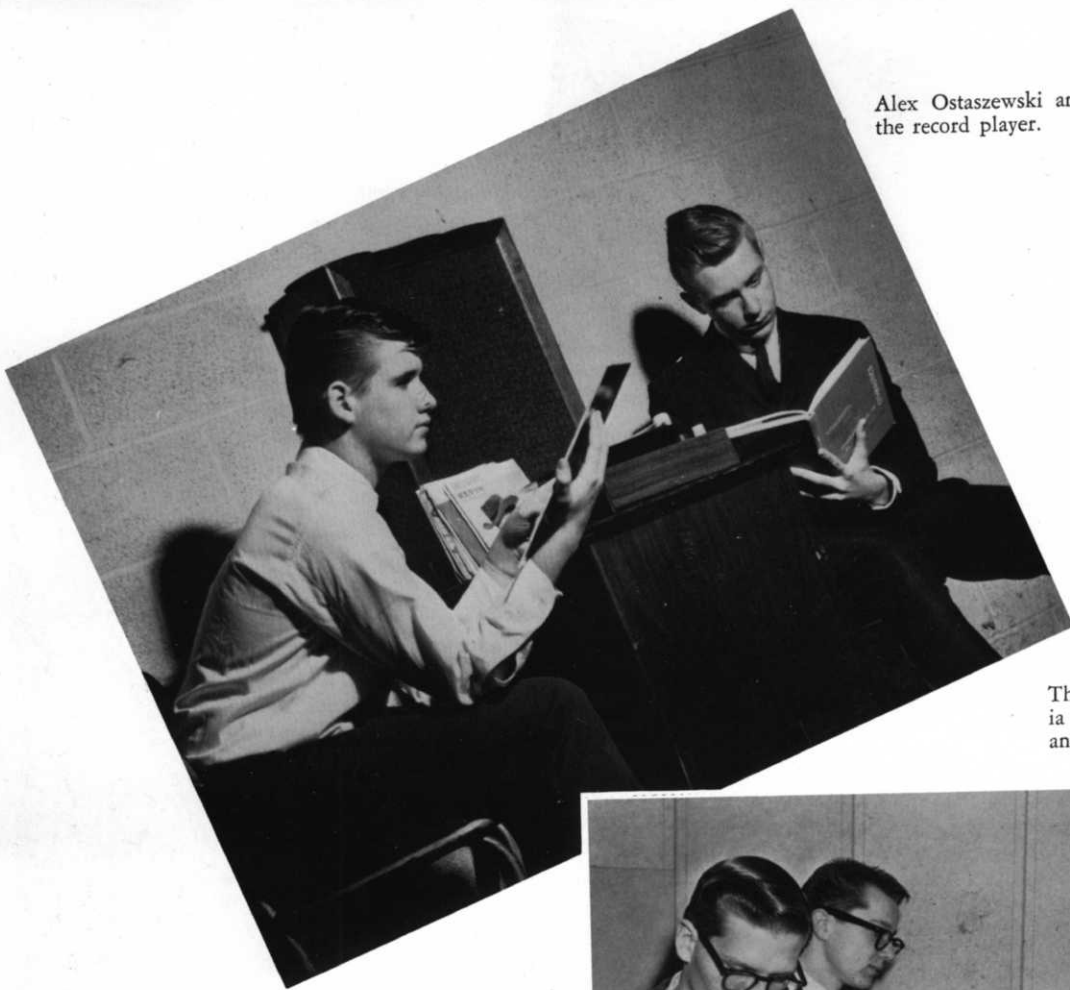

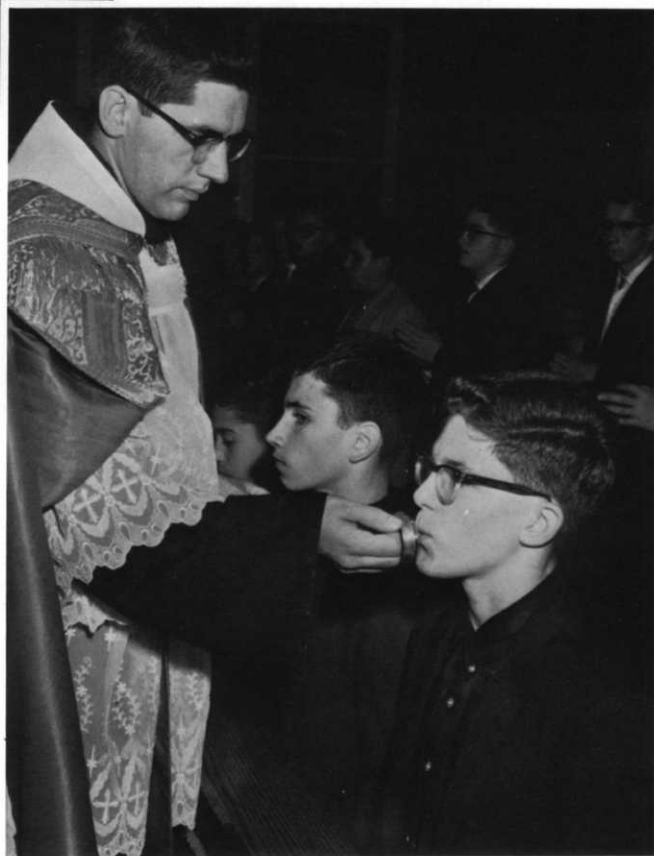

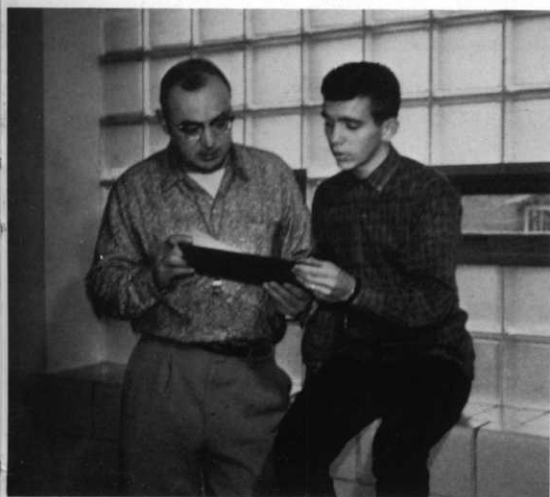

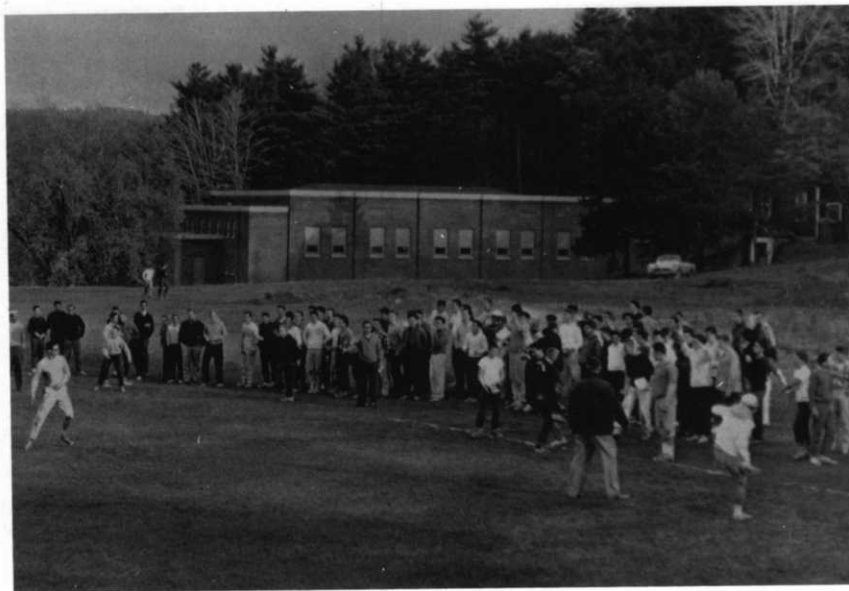

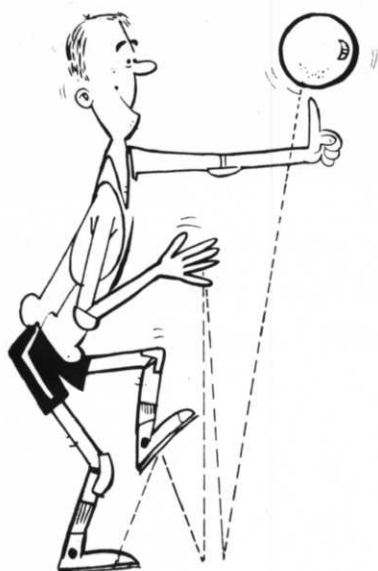

Varsity Basketball

Mr. Richard O'Neil was coach of the varsity squad this season. Although they had a 7-11 season, most of the scores were close and all the games were hard fought.

On February 1, the Cascaders defeated Mt. Carmel of Auburn, New York, in a double period overtime. This was the first time since the 1956-57 season that Padua defeated the Carmelites.

6'4" senior, Dennis Springer, replaced Jack Marcheski, '60, for second place for the most points scored during a season by bucketing 310 points. Marcheski had 286, and the first place is still held by Ed Opiola, '56, who had 345. Dennis' highest scoring game was against Notre Dame on January 27 when he made 30; 21 of these were scored in the fourth quarter.

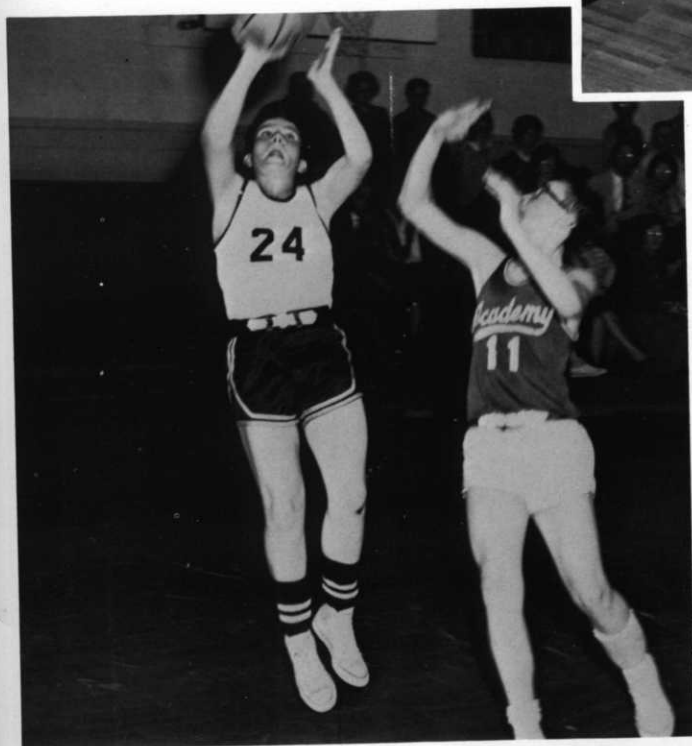

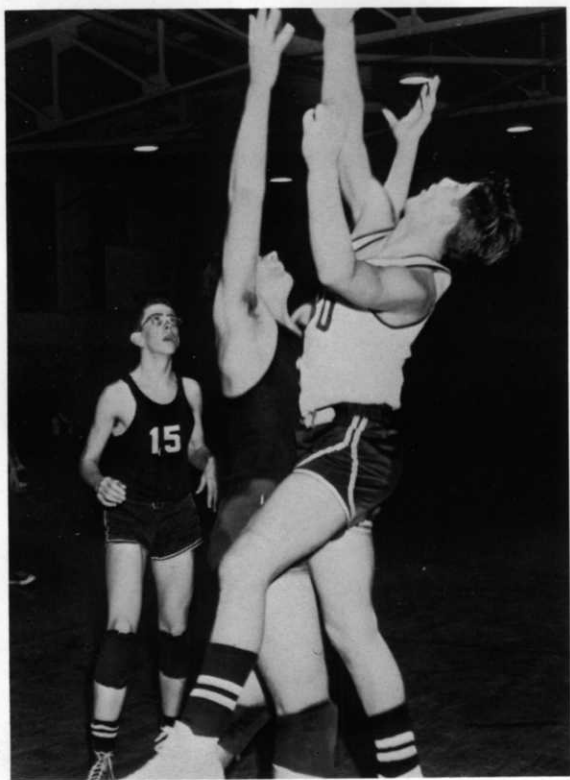

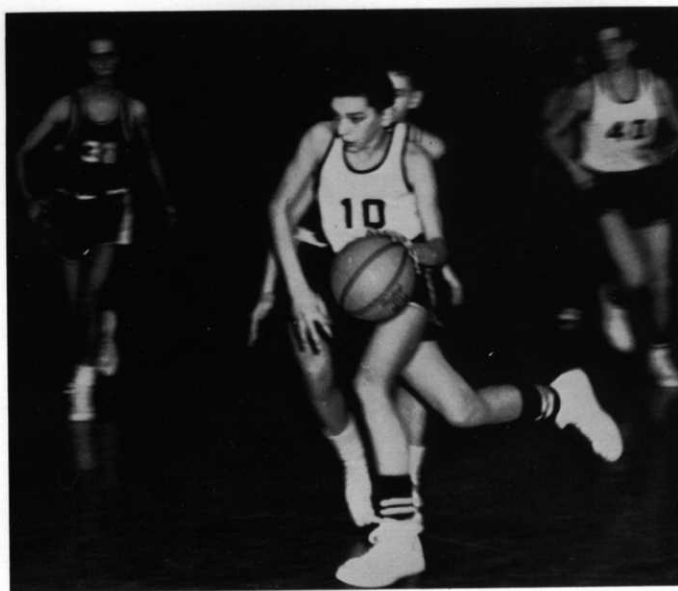

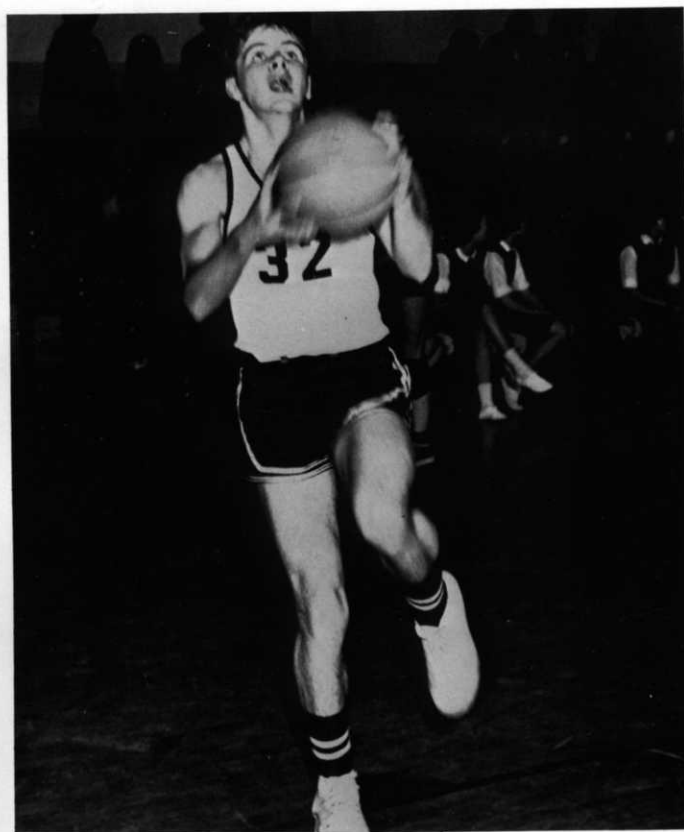

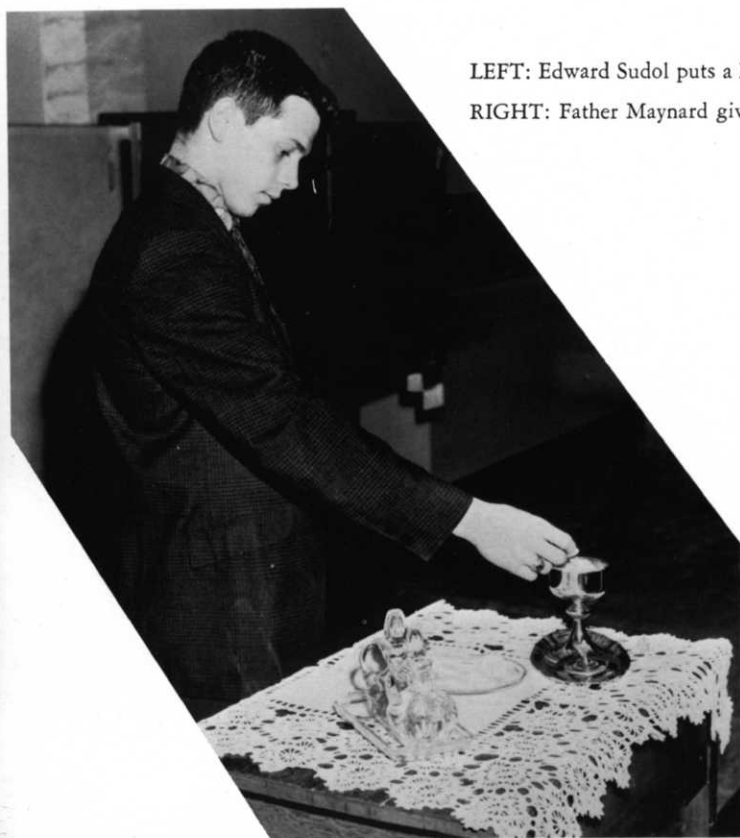
The Stations of the Cross is one of the most indulgenced prayers of the Church.

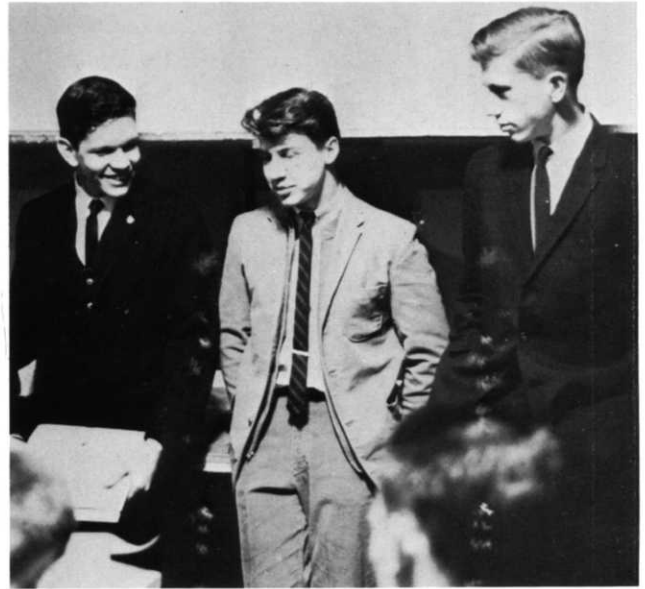
Youth County

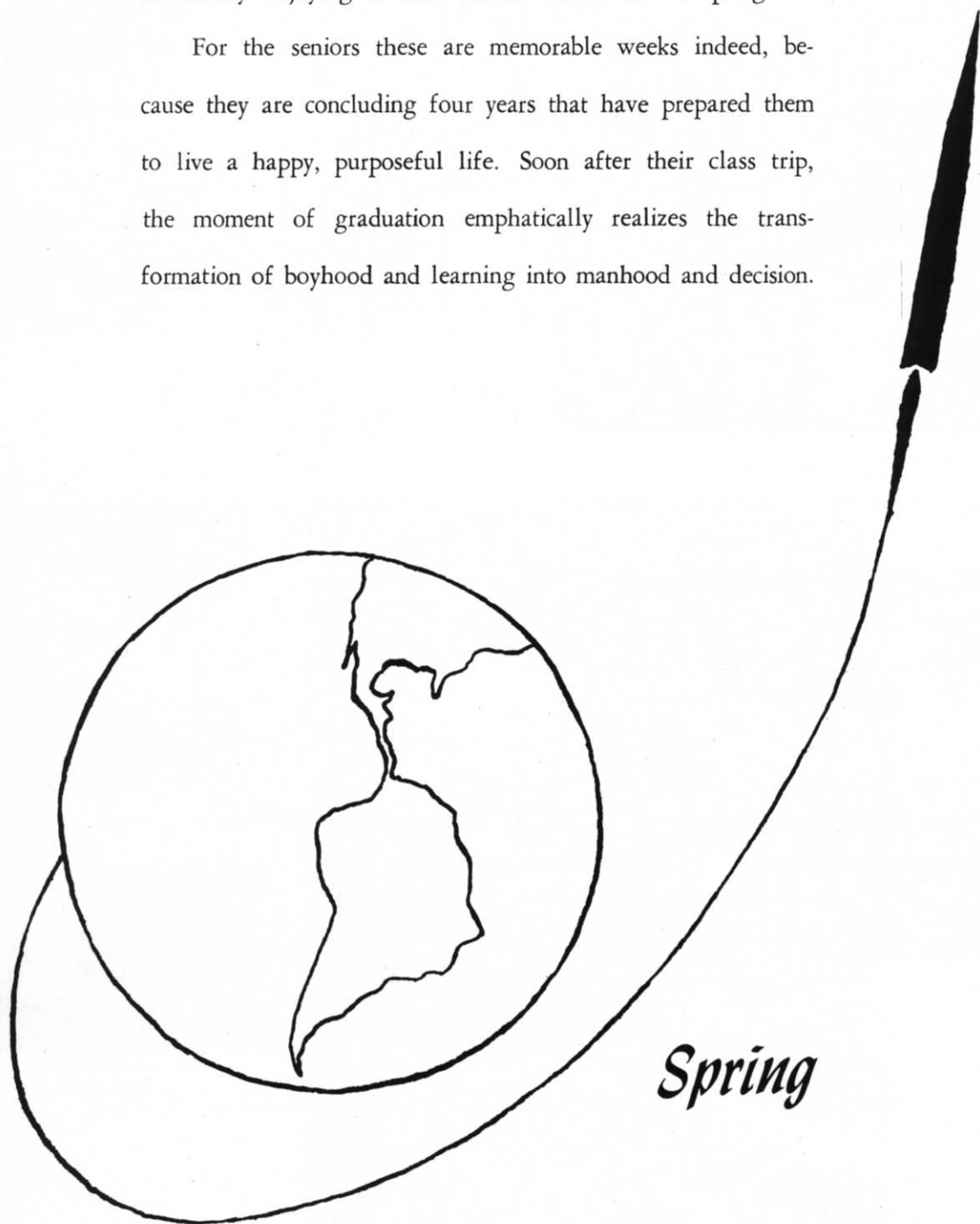

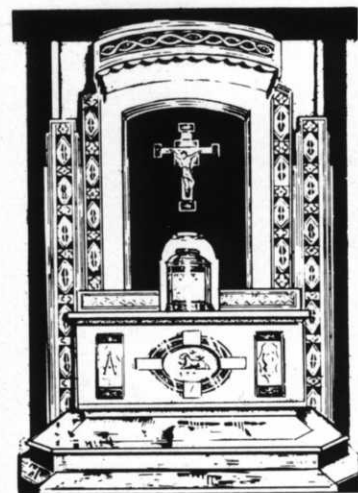
Student Council

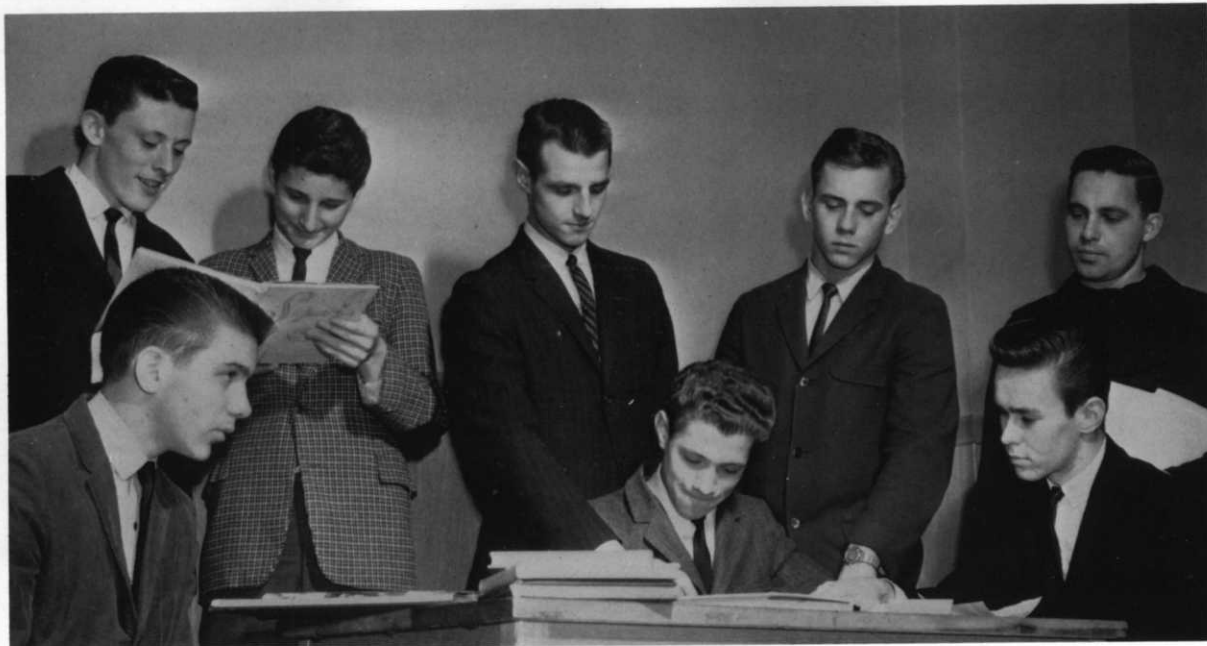

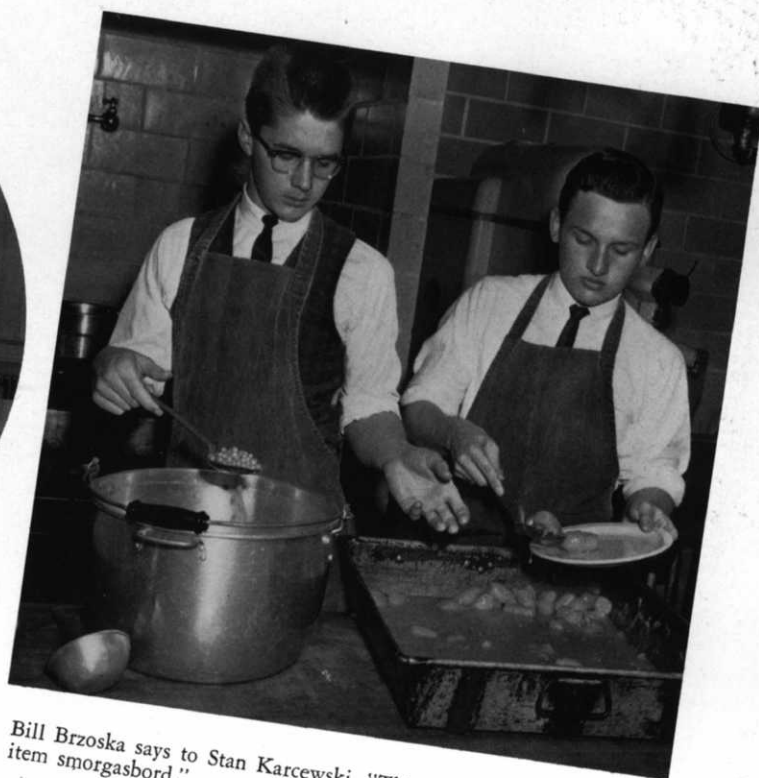

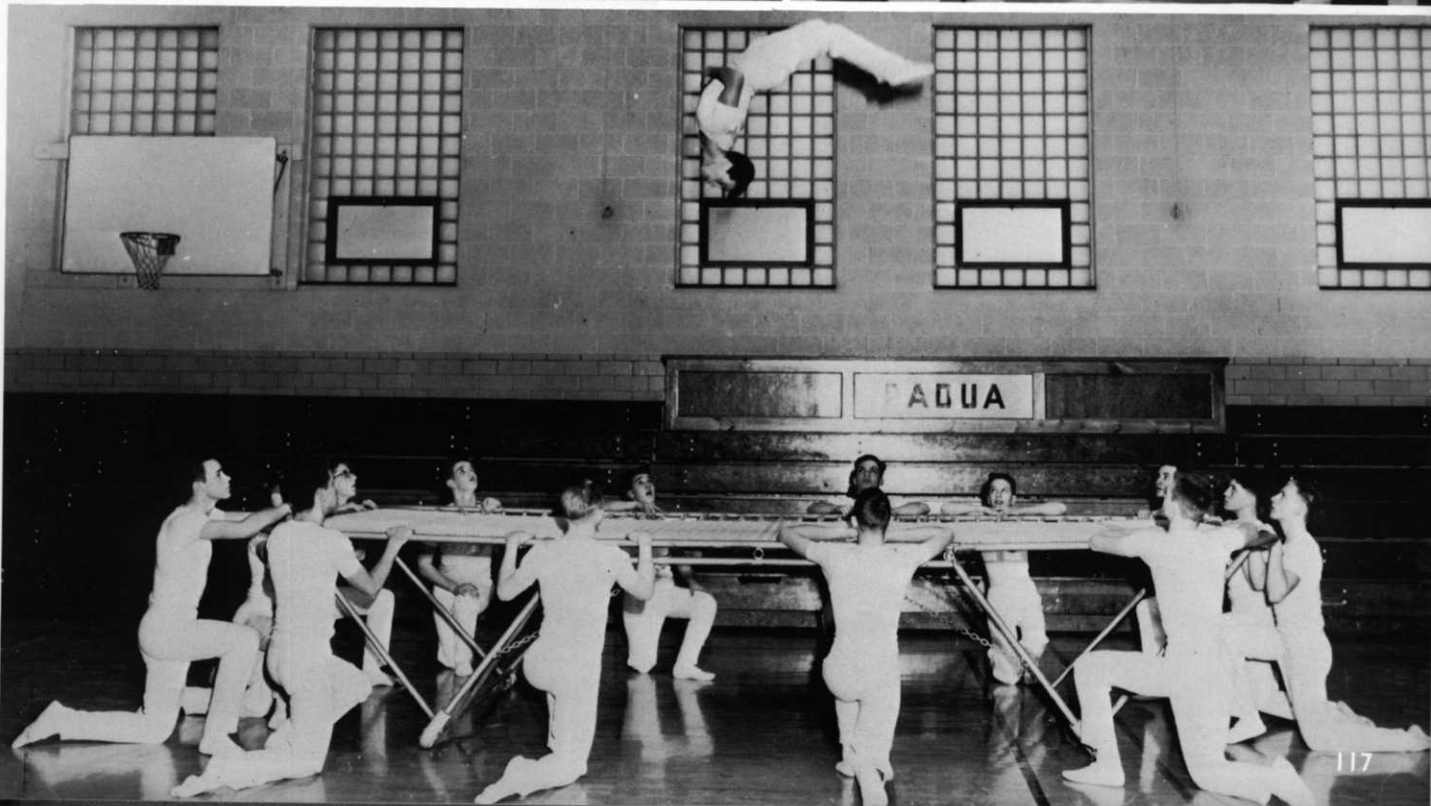
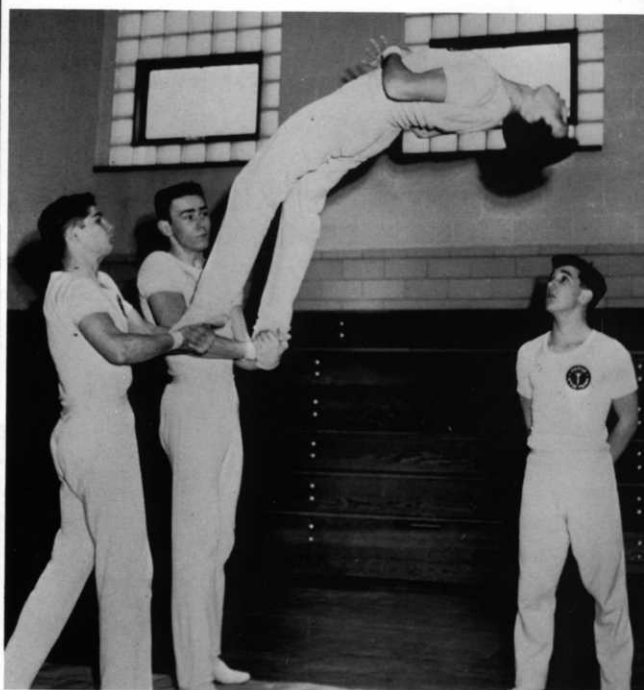
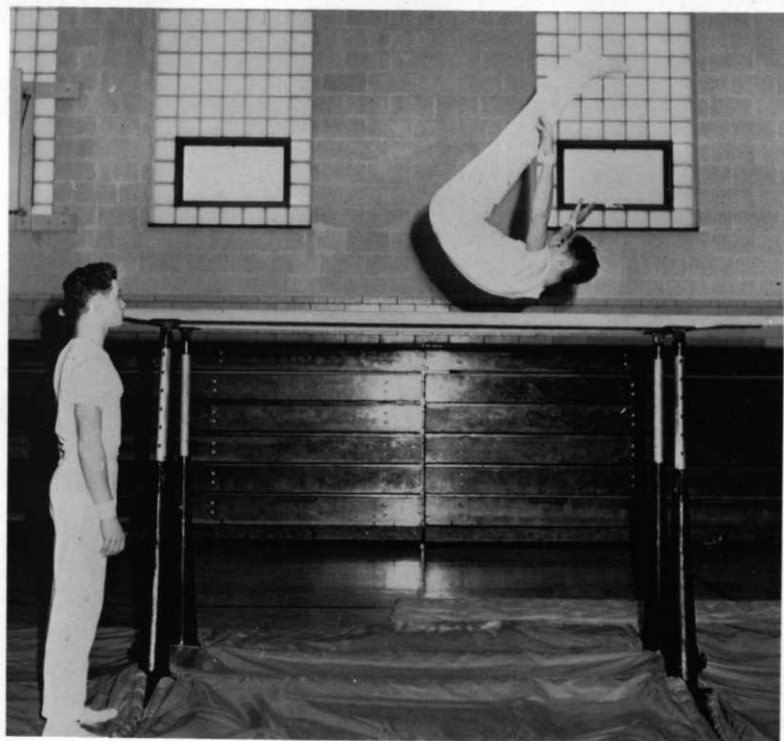
Gym Team
