FOREWORD

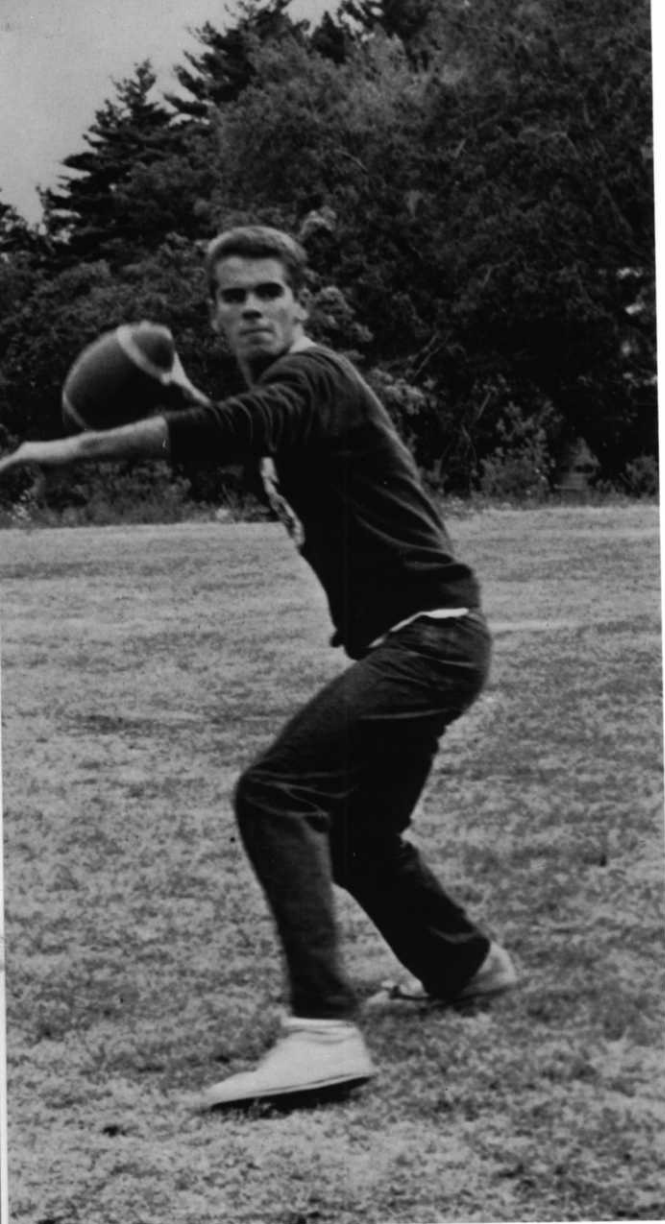
For over a decade now boys have been coming to Padua; for nigh 12 years young men have been graduating from Padua. At last it is our turn.

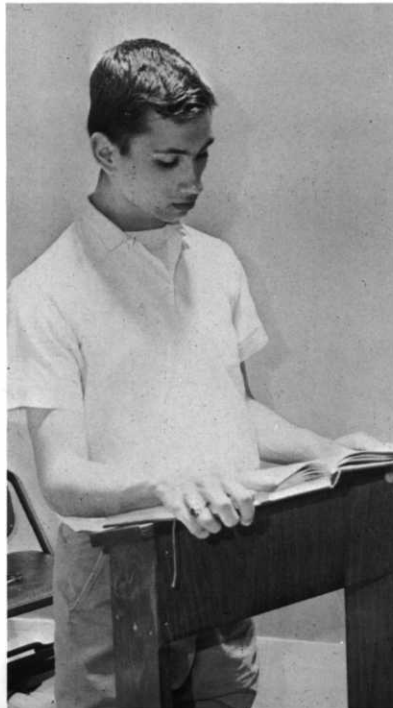

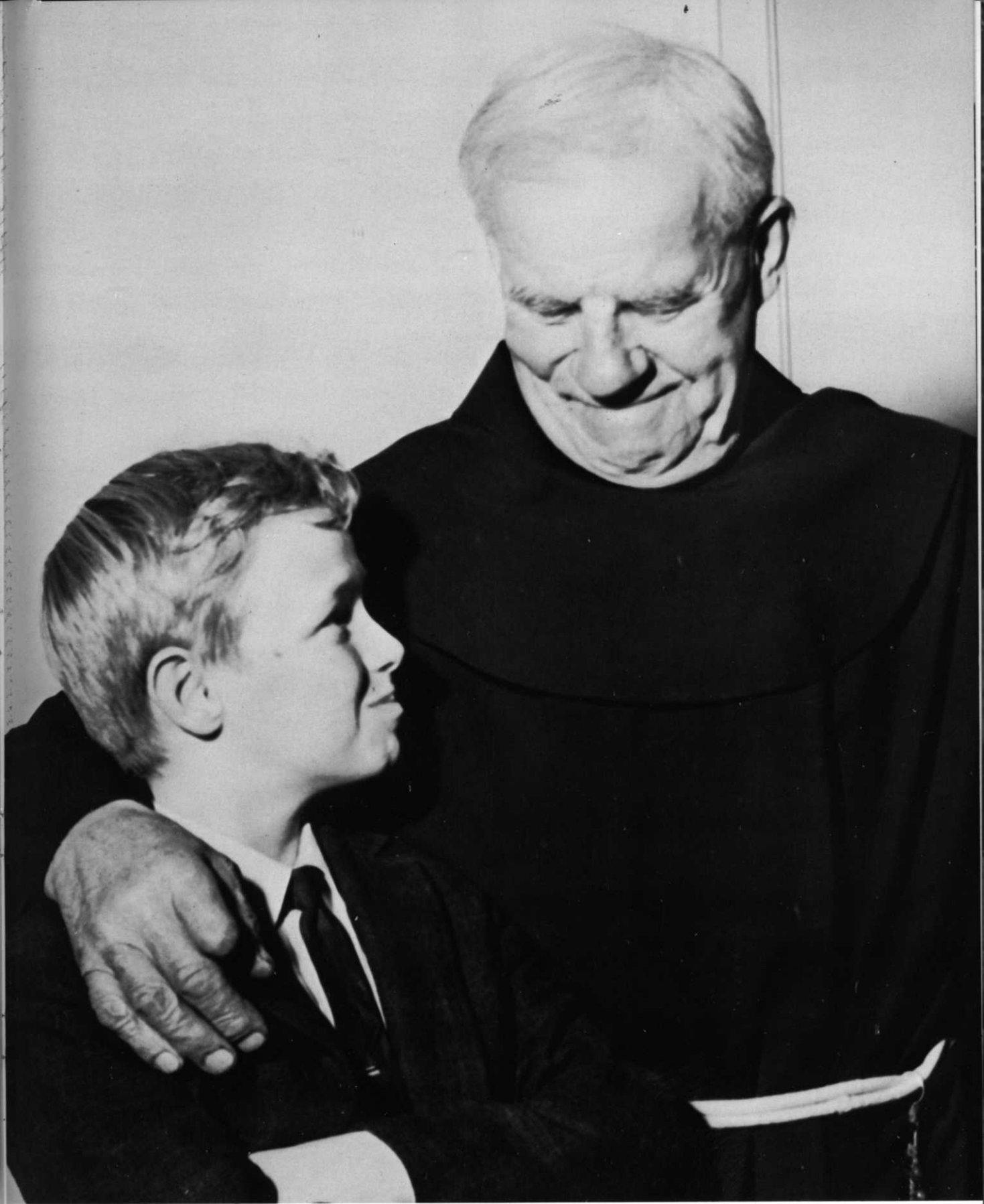

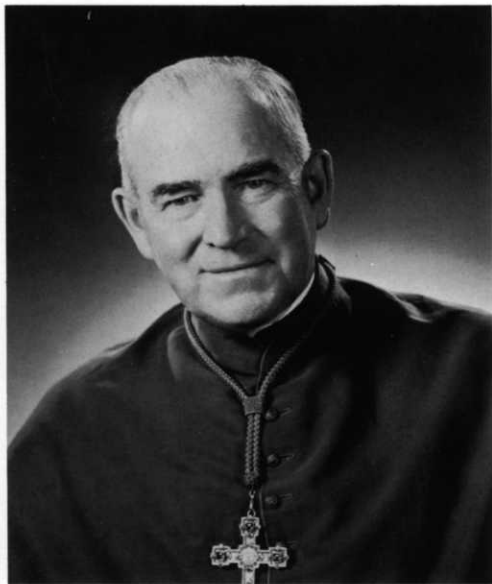
DEDICATION

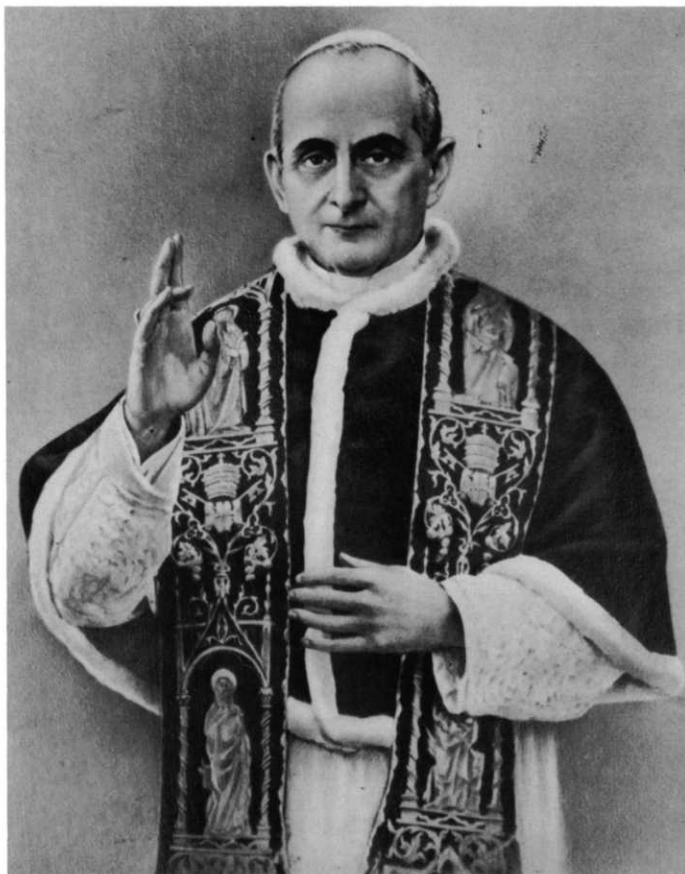

FACULTY



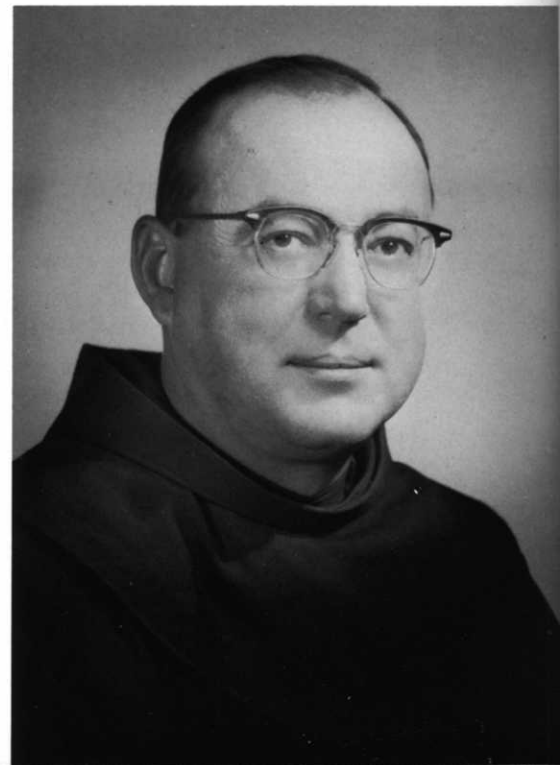
Fr. Hyacinth Kulinski, O.F.M., Rector

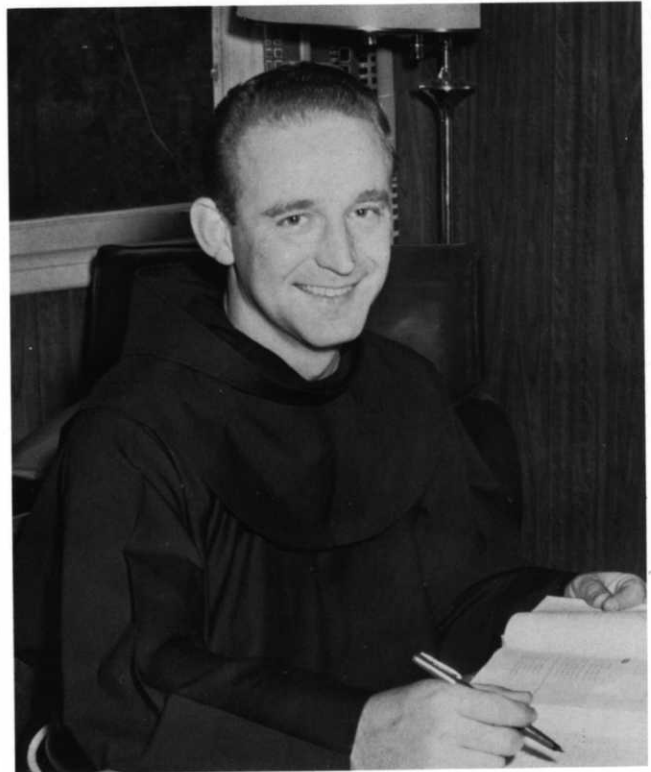
Fr. Mel Baran, O.F.M.

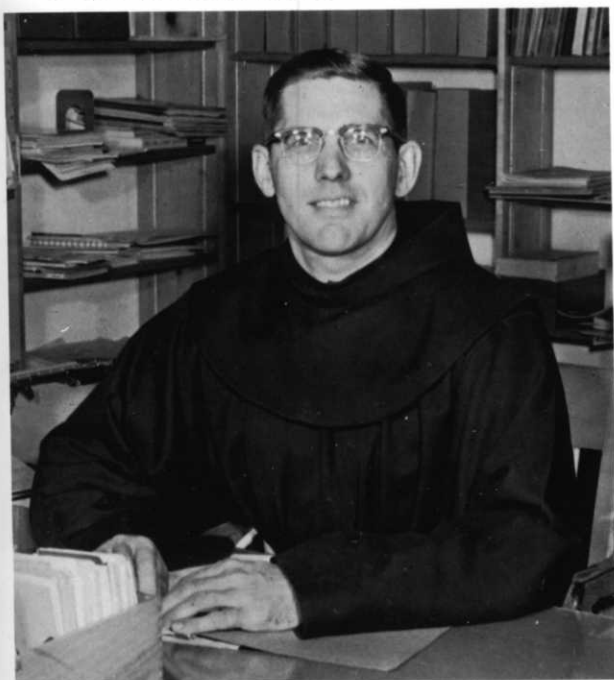
Fr. Eric Skalski, O.F.M.

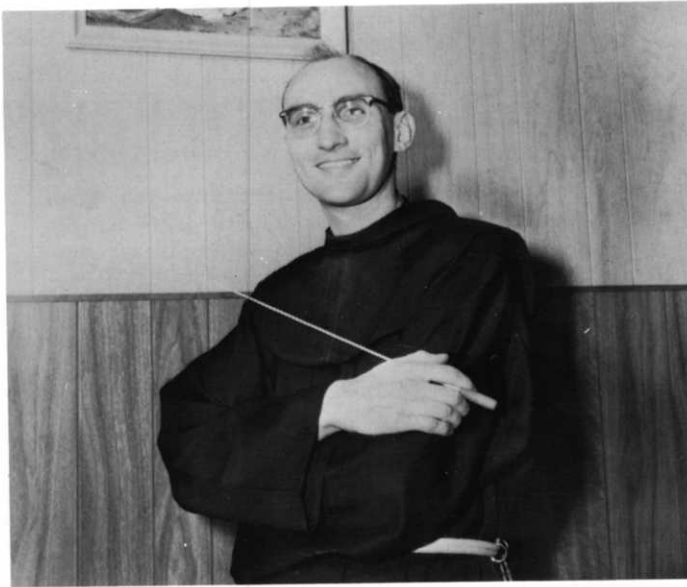
Fr. Cajetan Bogdanski, O.F.M.

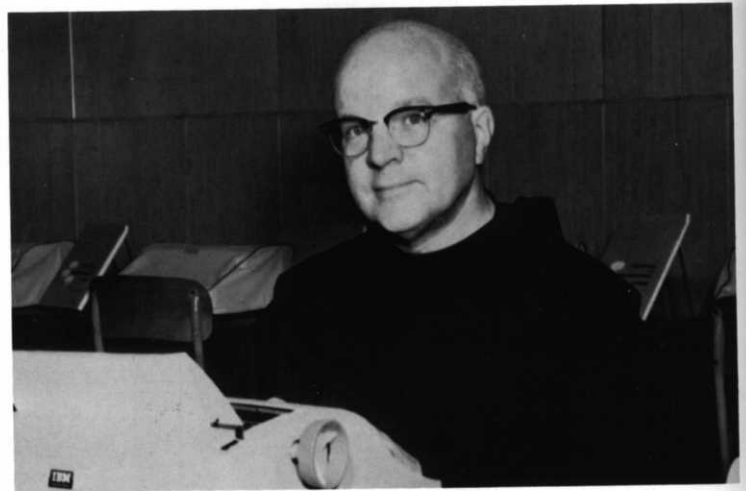
Fr. Brendan Wroblewski, O.F.M.

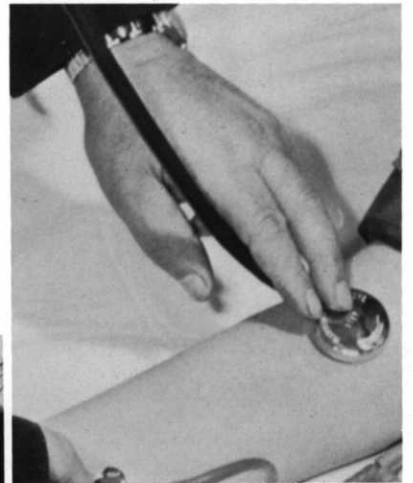
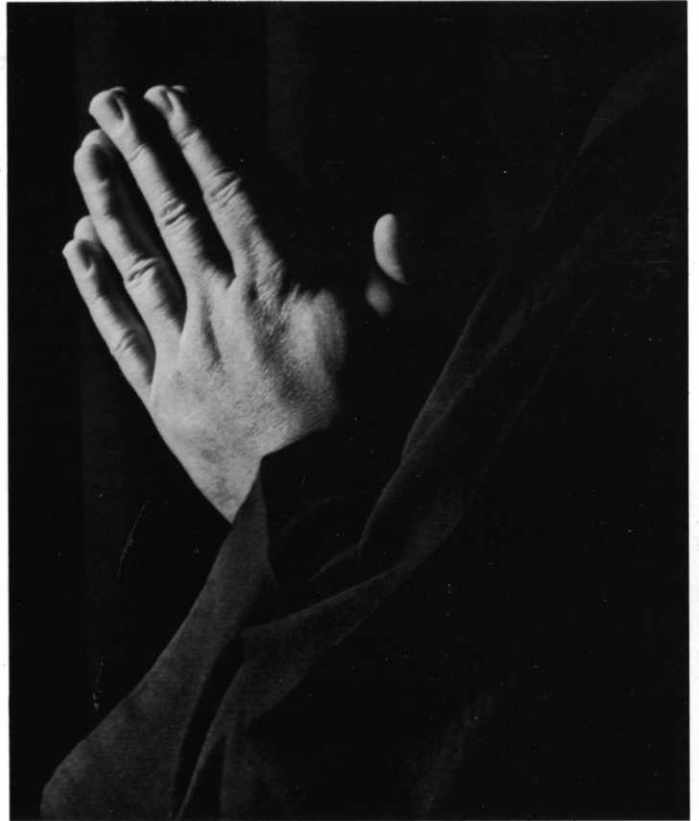


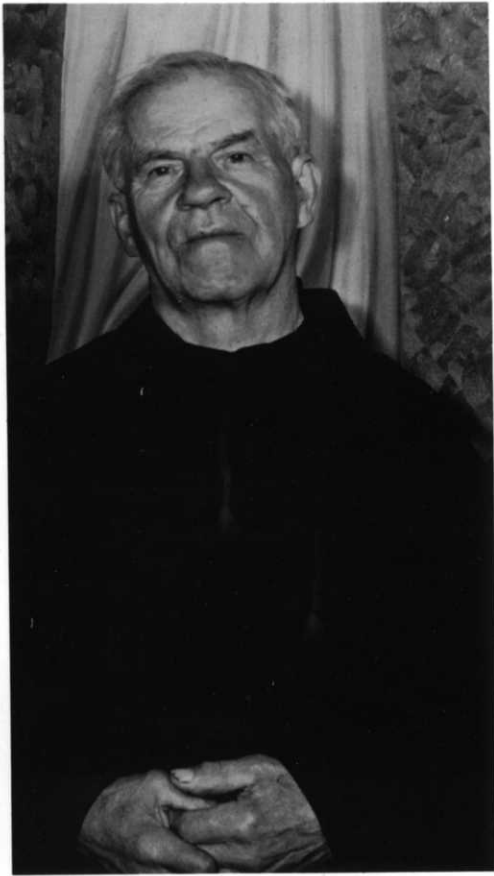
Fr. Cherubin Drag, O.F.M.

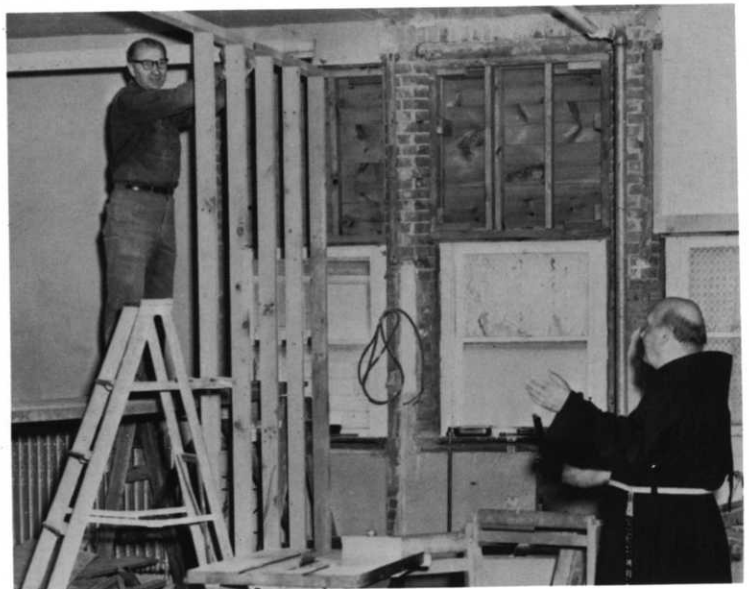

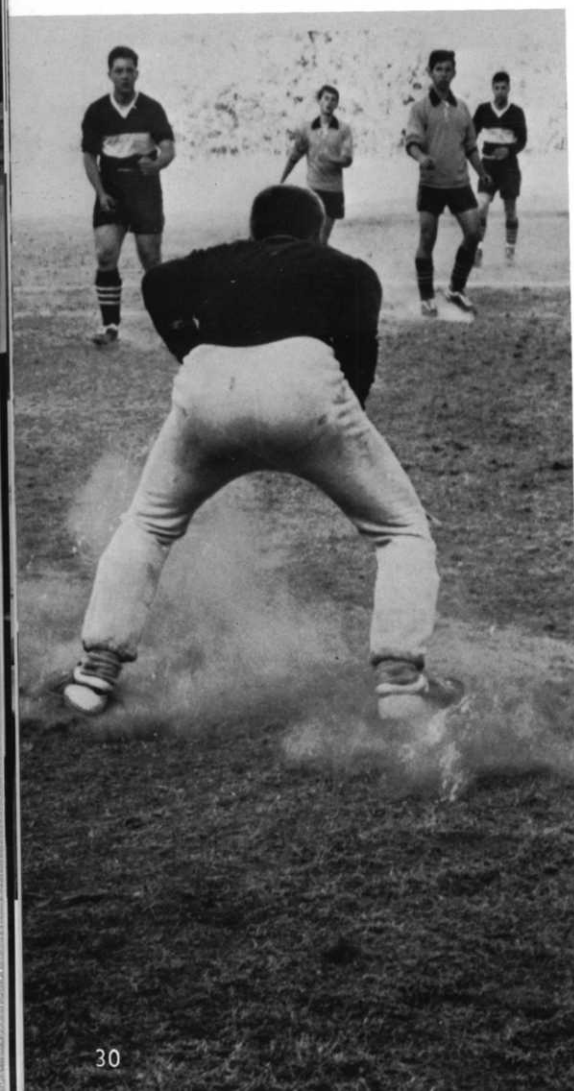

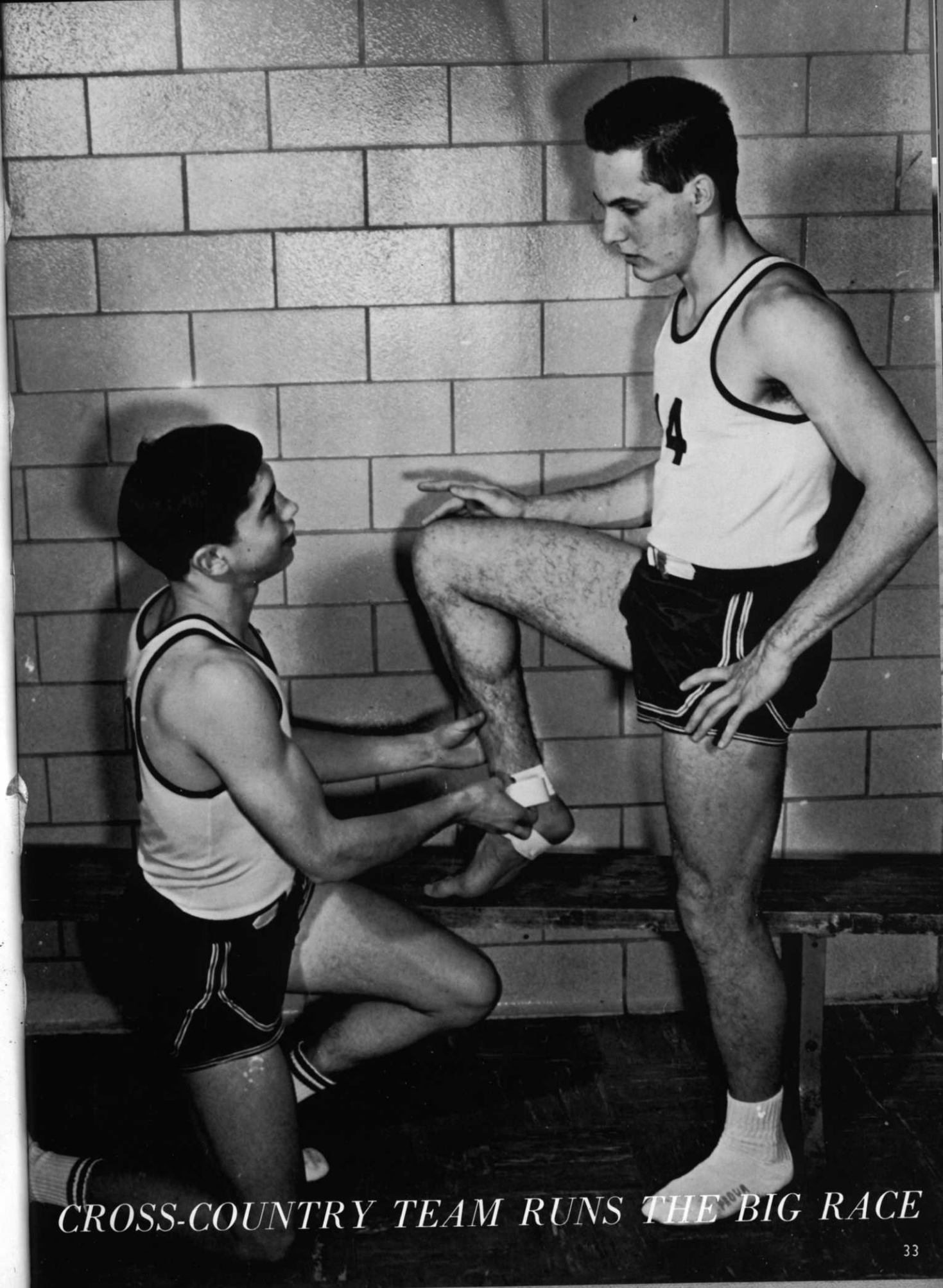

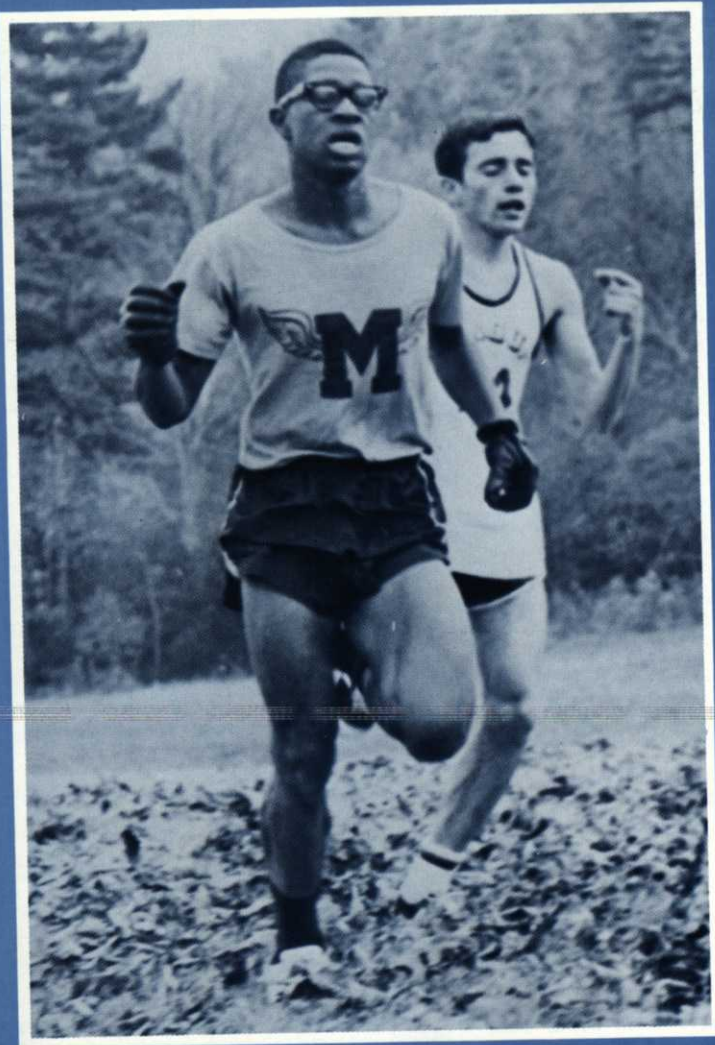

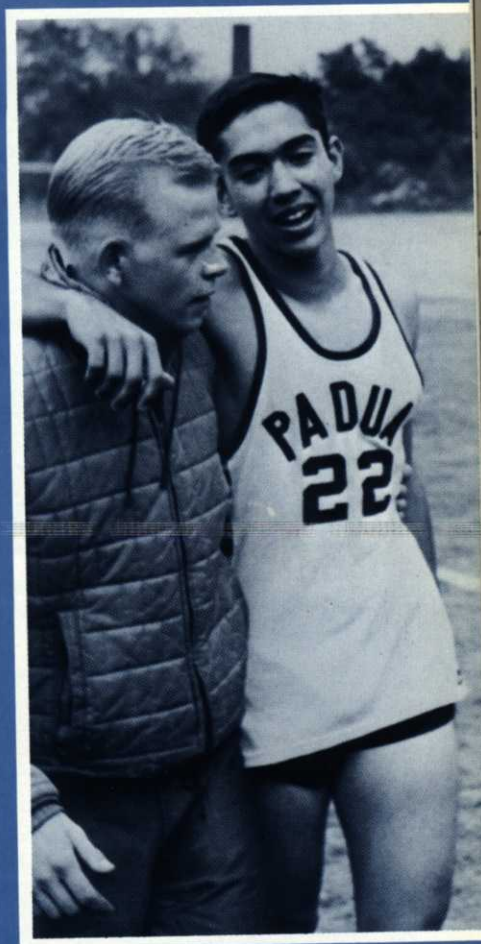

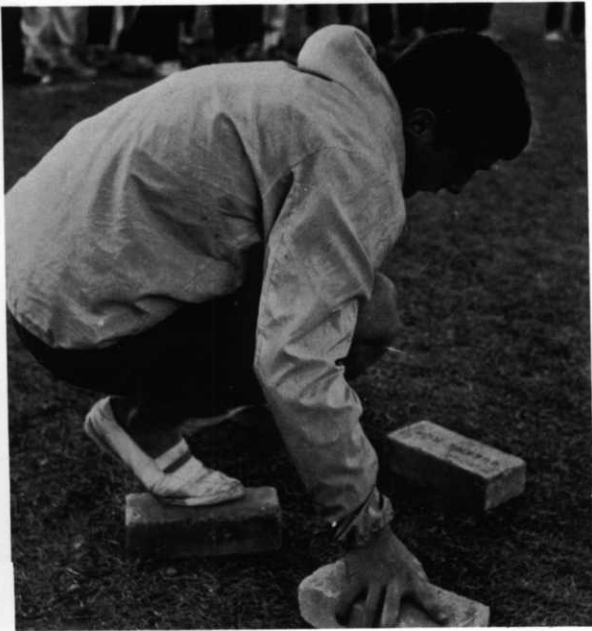

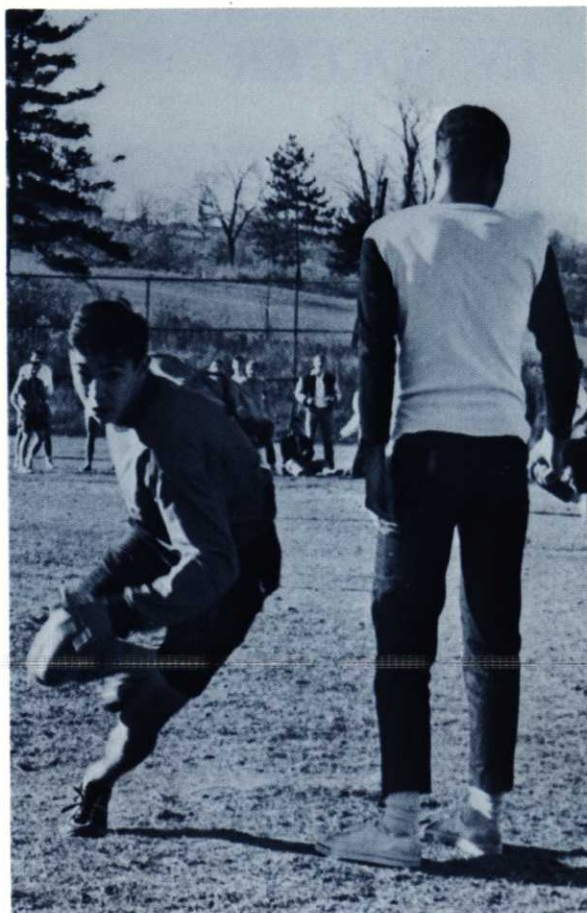

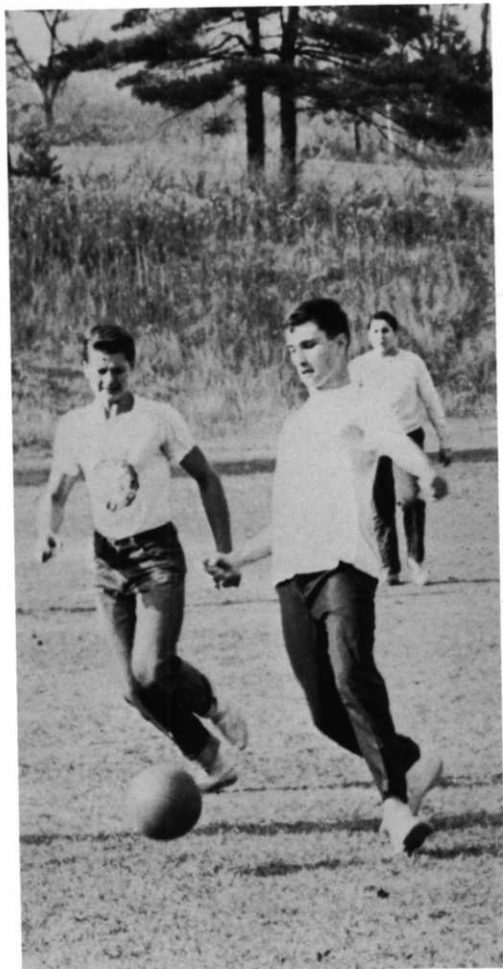

SOPHOMORES MAKE PROGRESS AFTER A YEAR'S EXPERIENCE



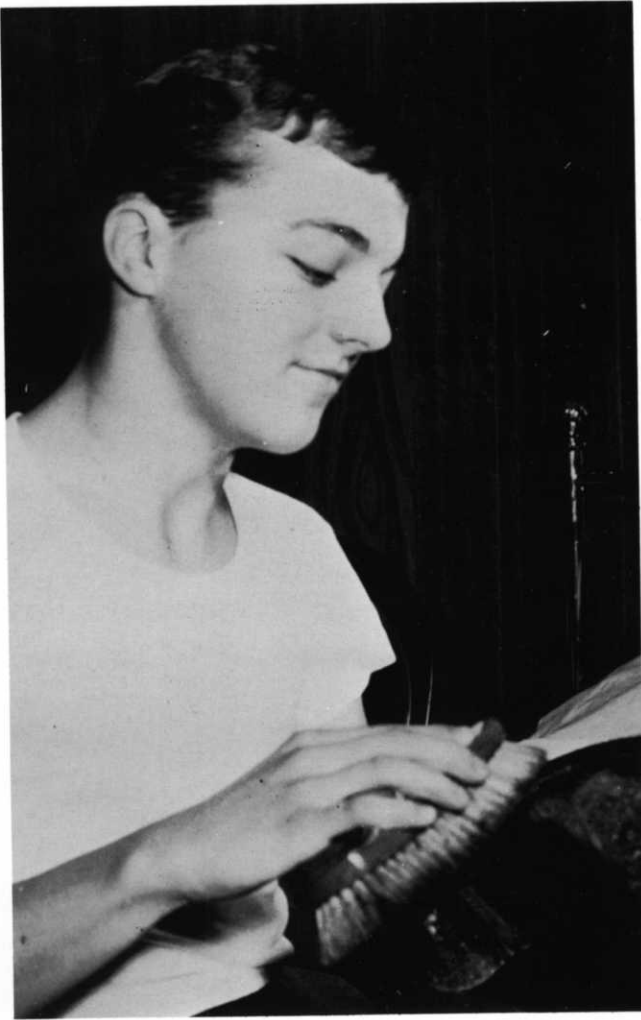

After spending one full year at Padua, the sophomores can now honestly say they are better prepared to cope with any problem that might confront them, as they strive towards the completion of their second year.

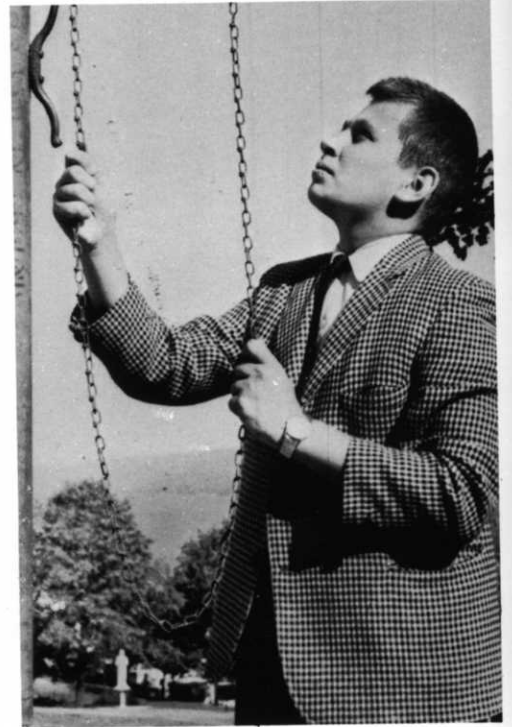

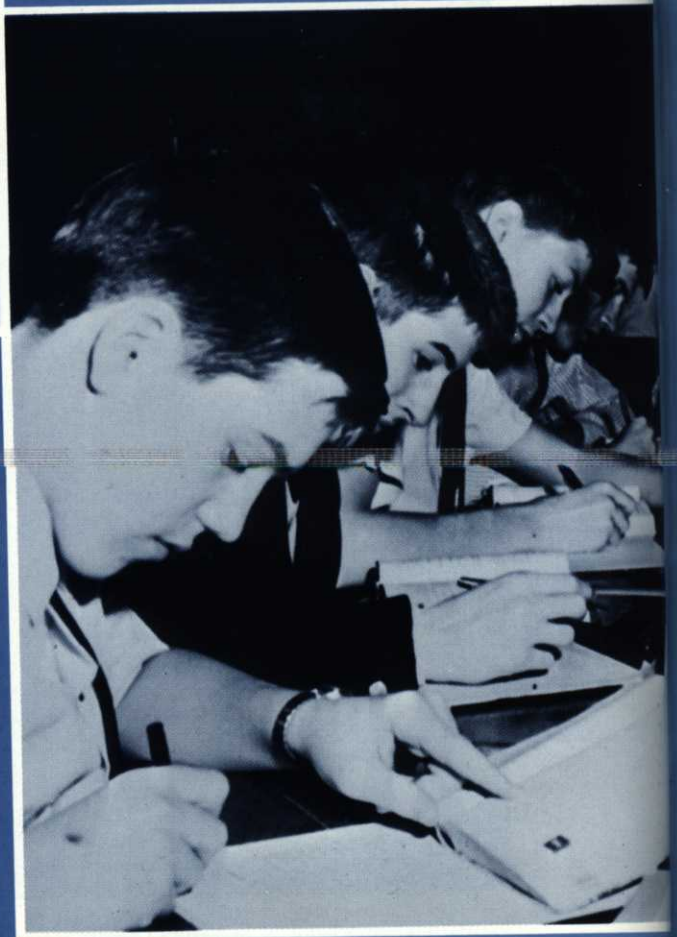

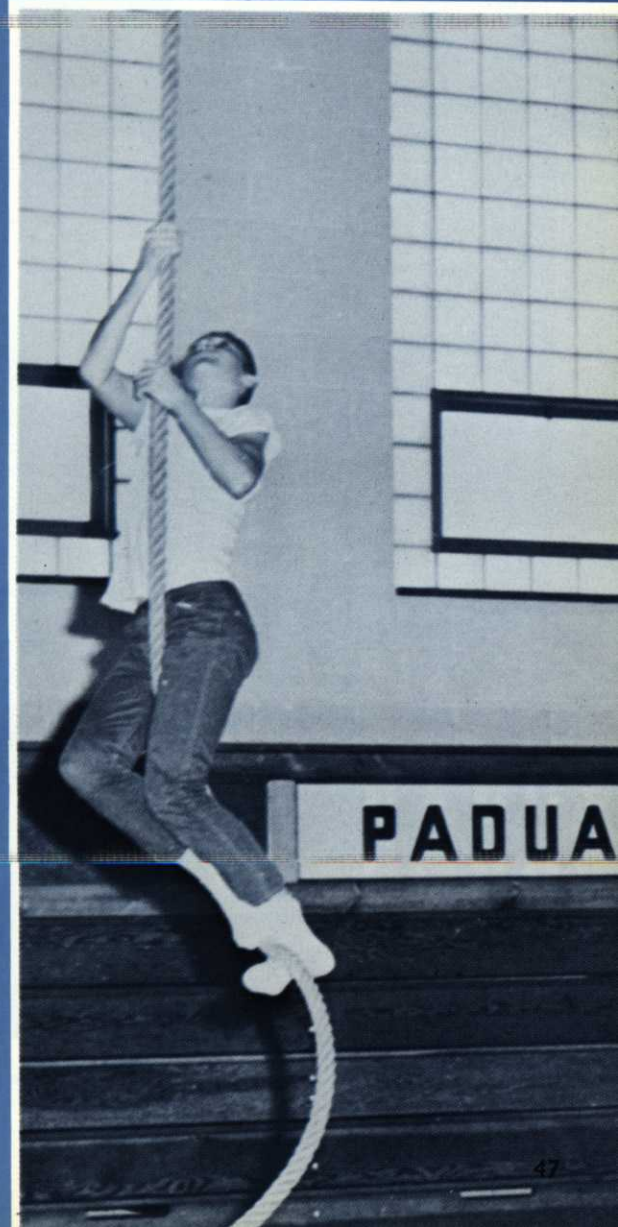

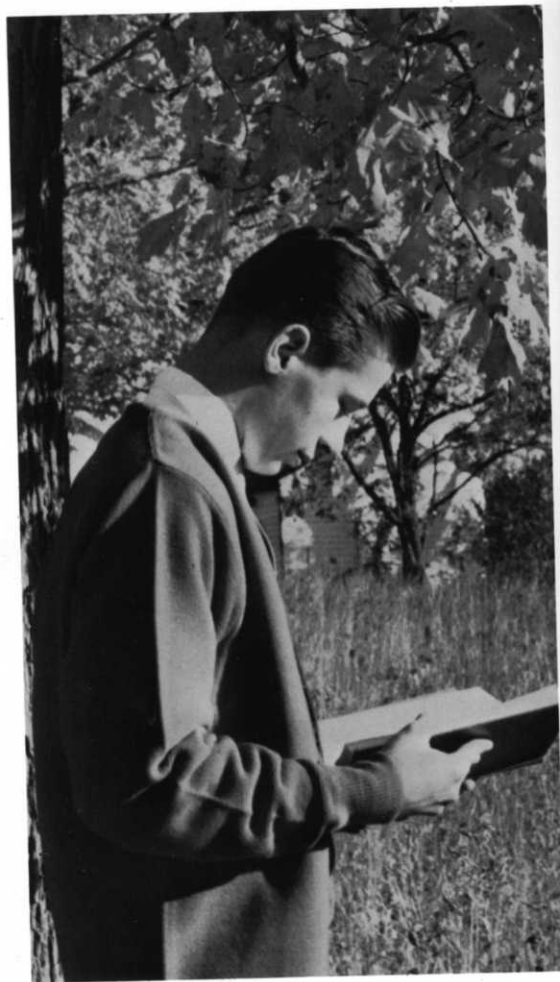

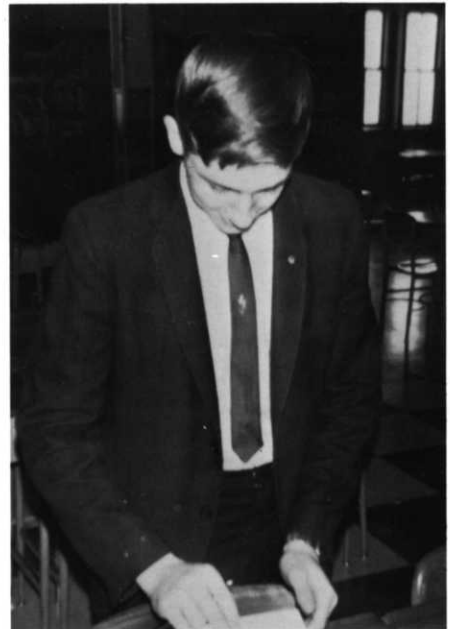

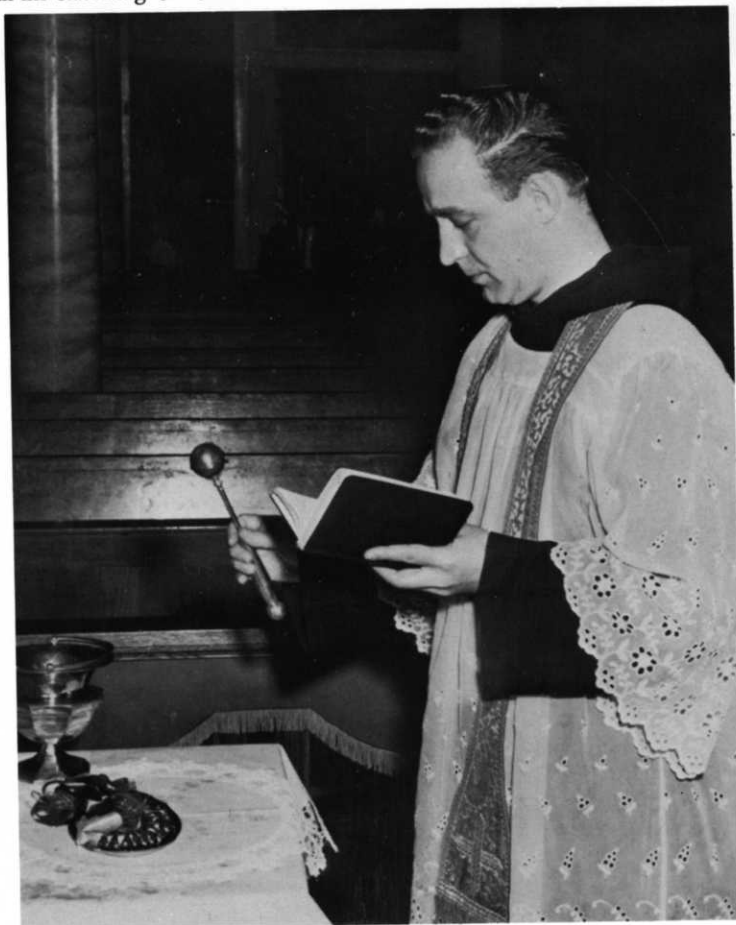

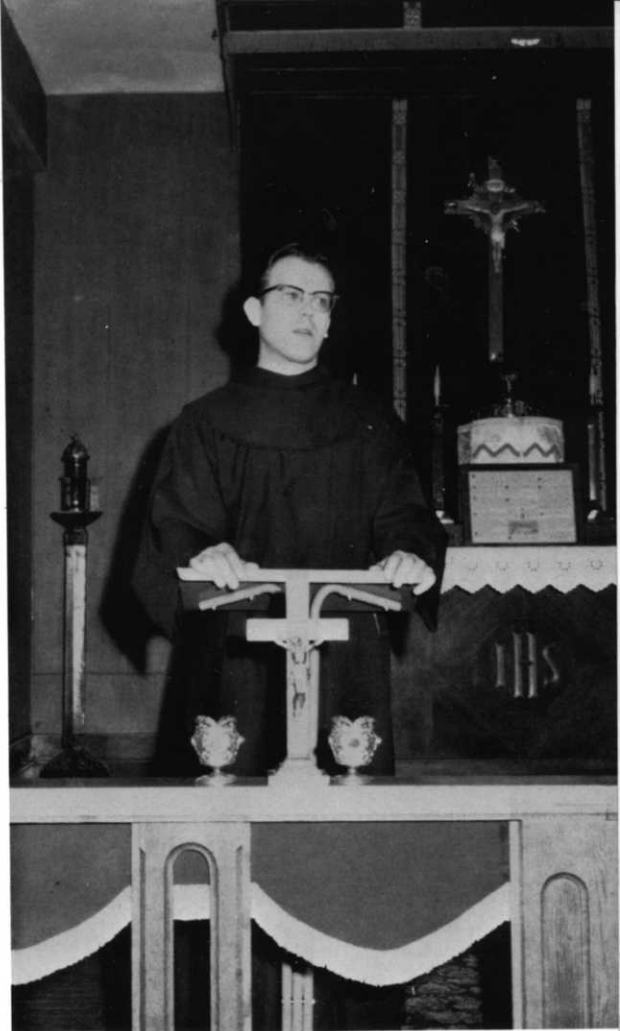

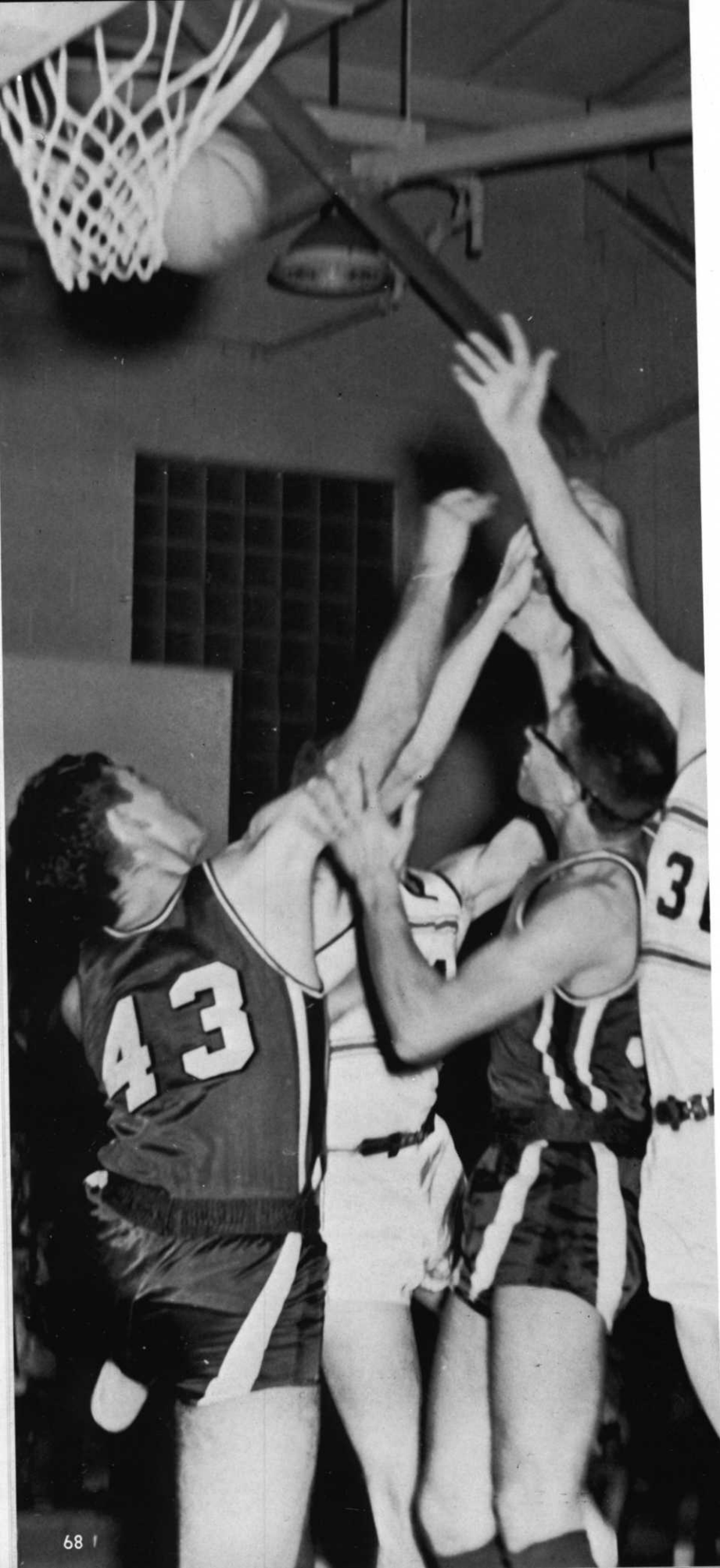

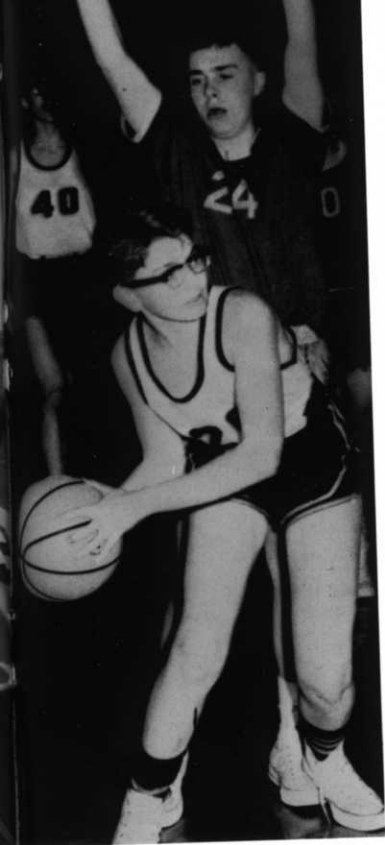

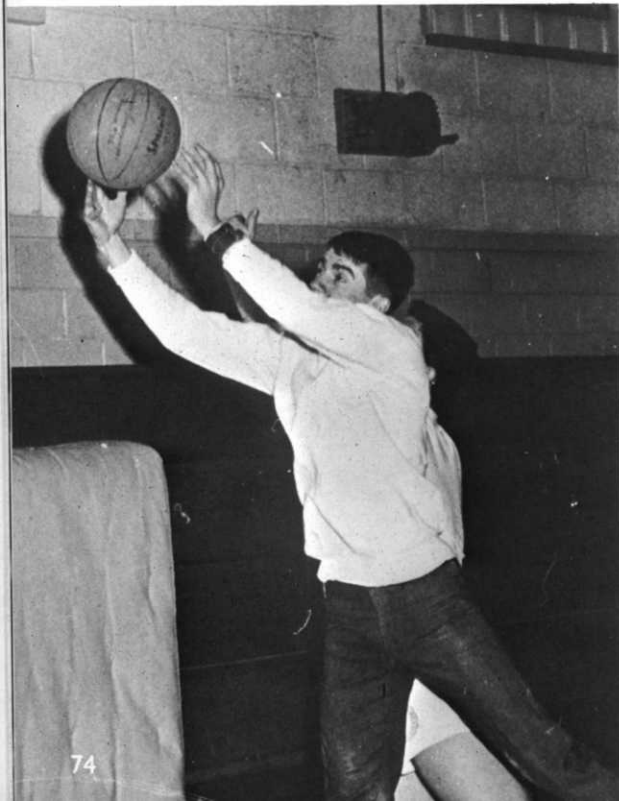

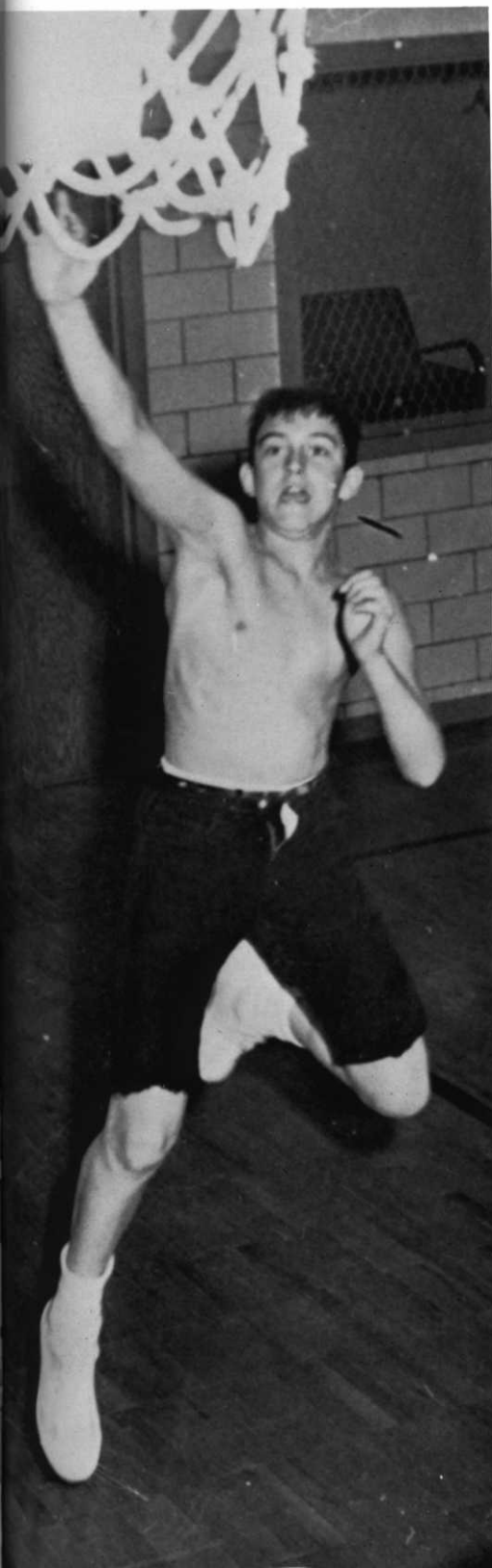

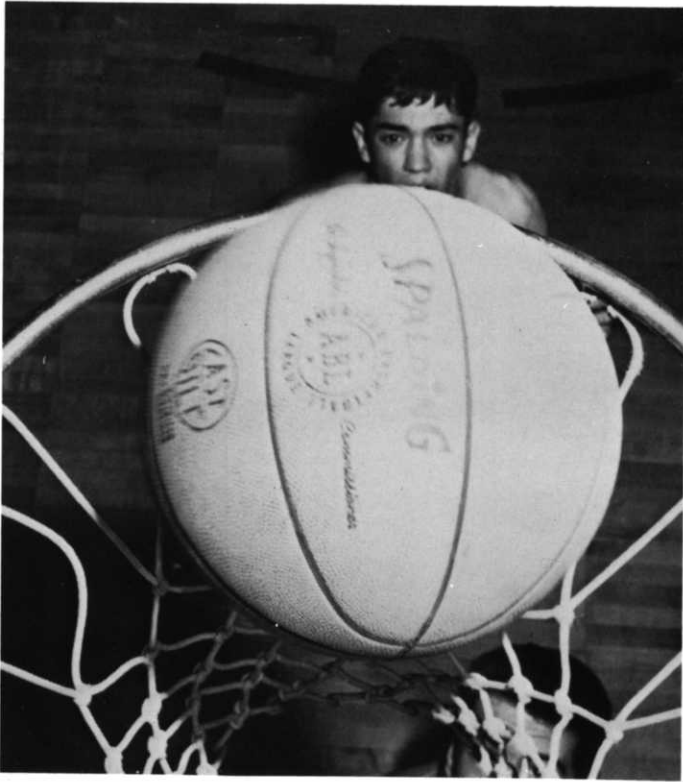

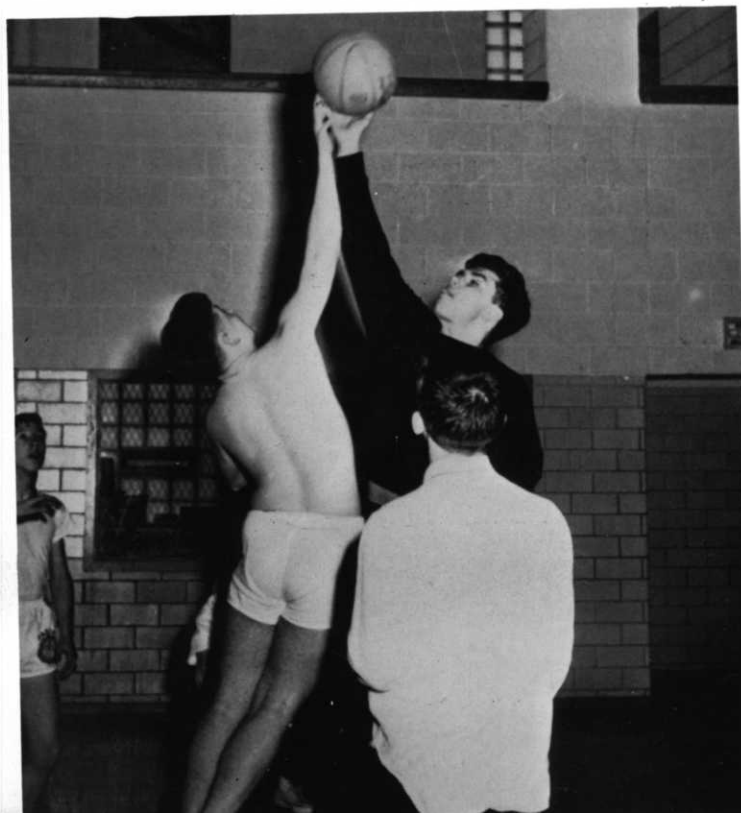

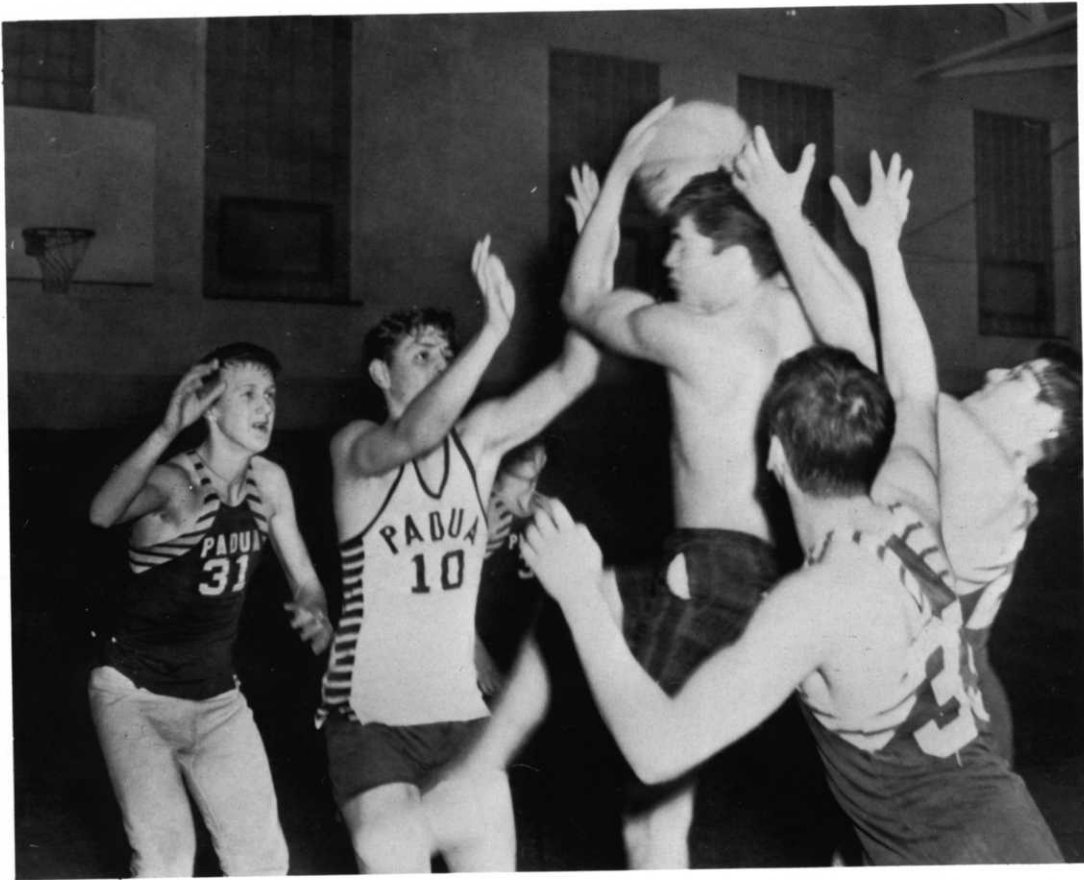

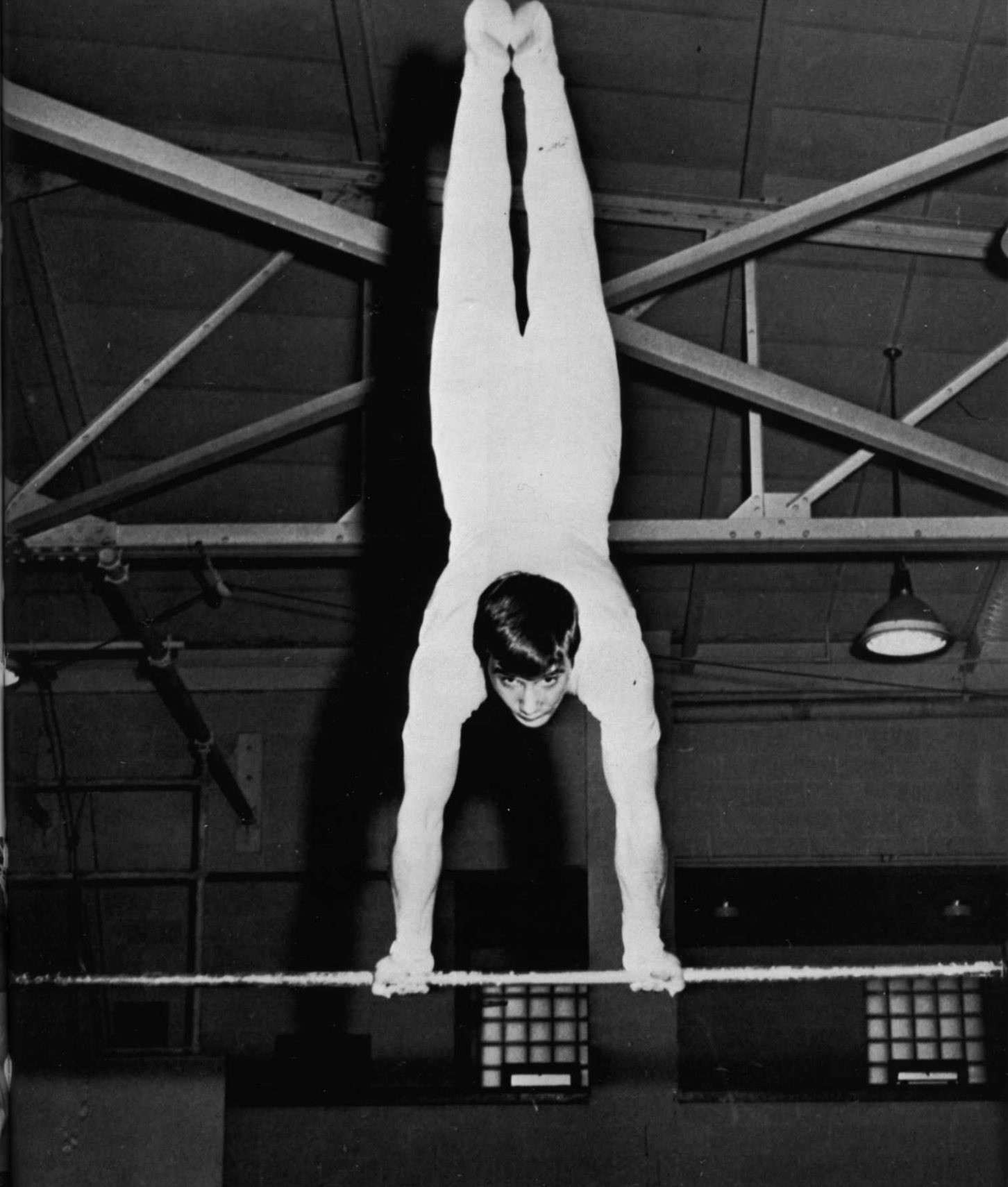

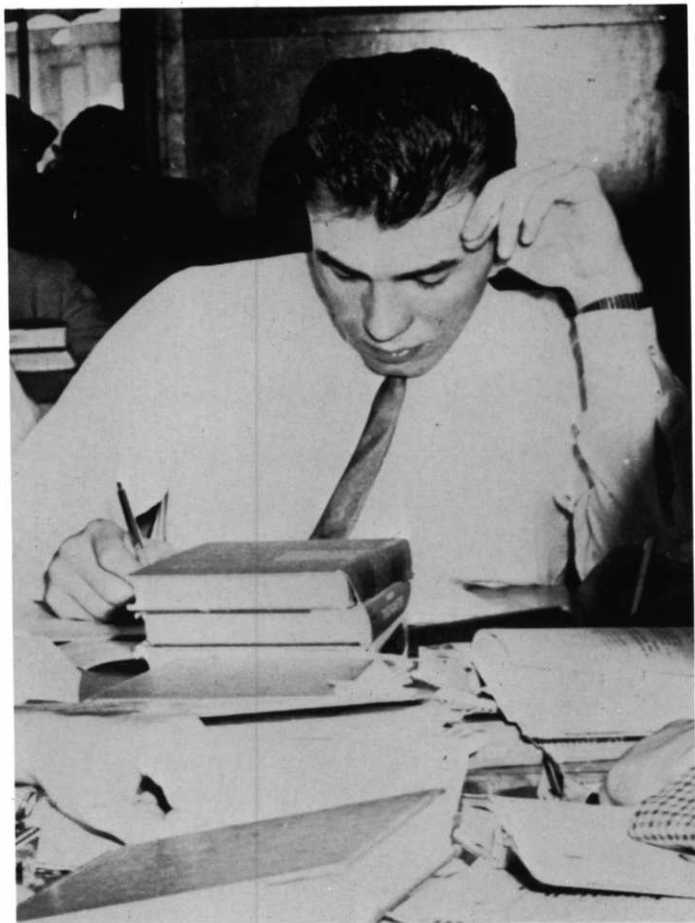

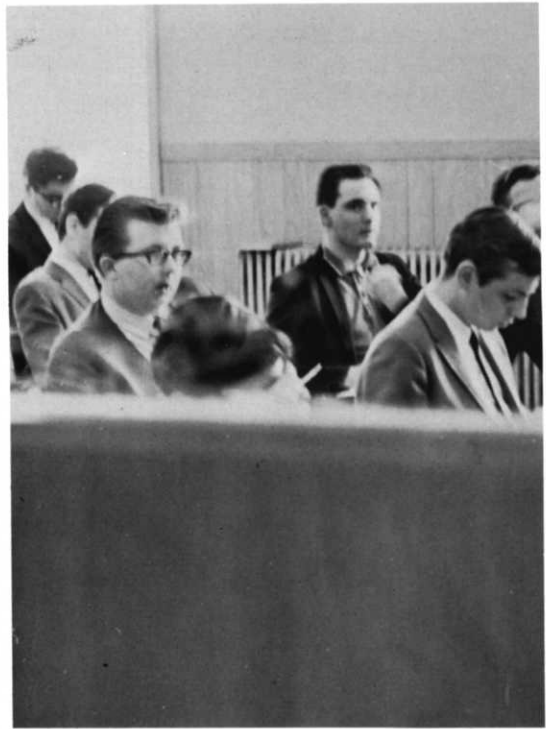

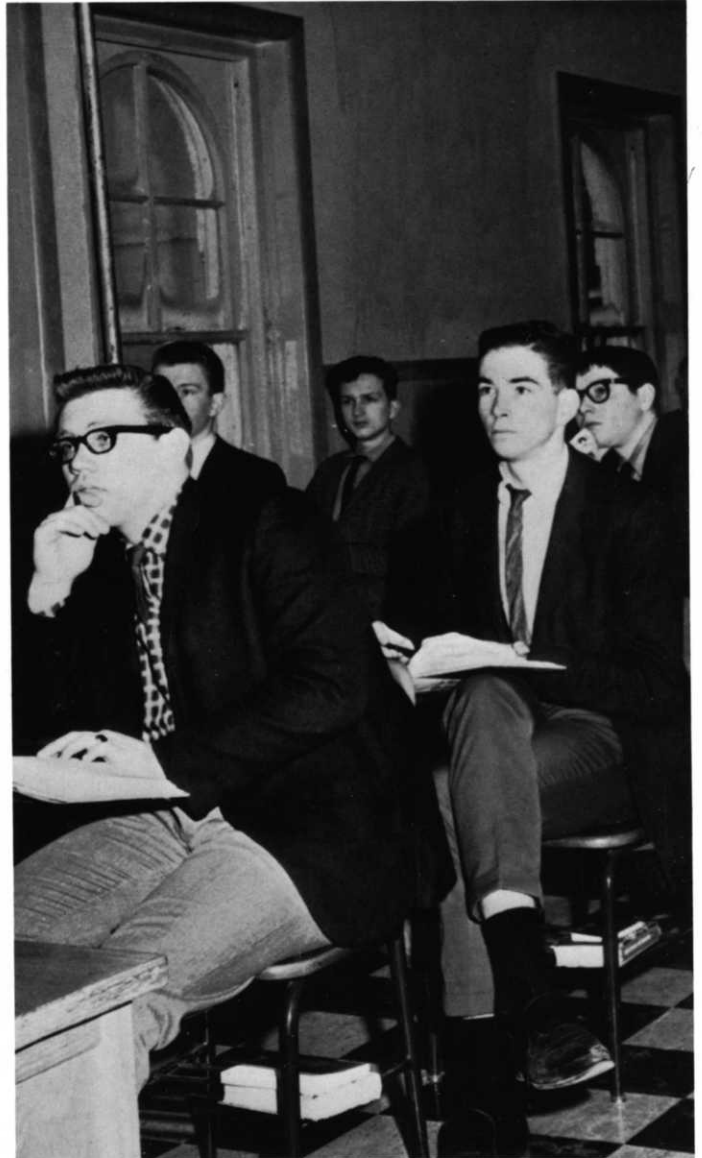

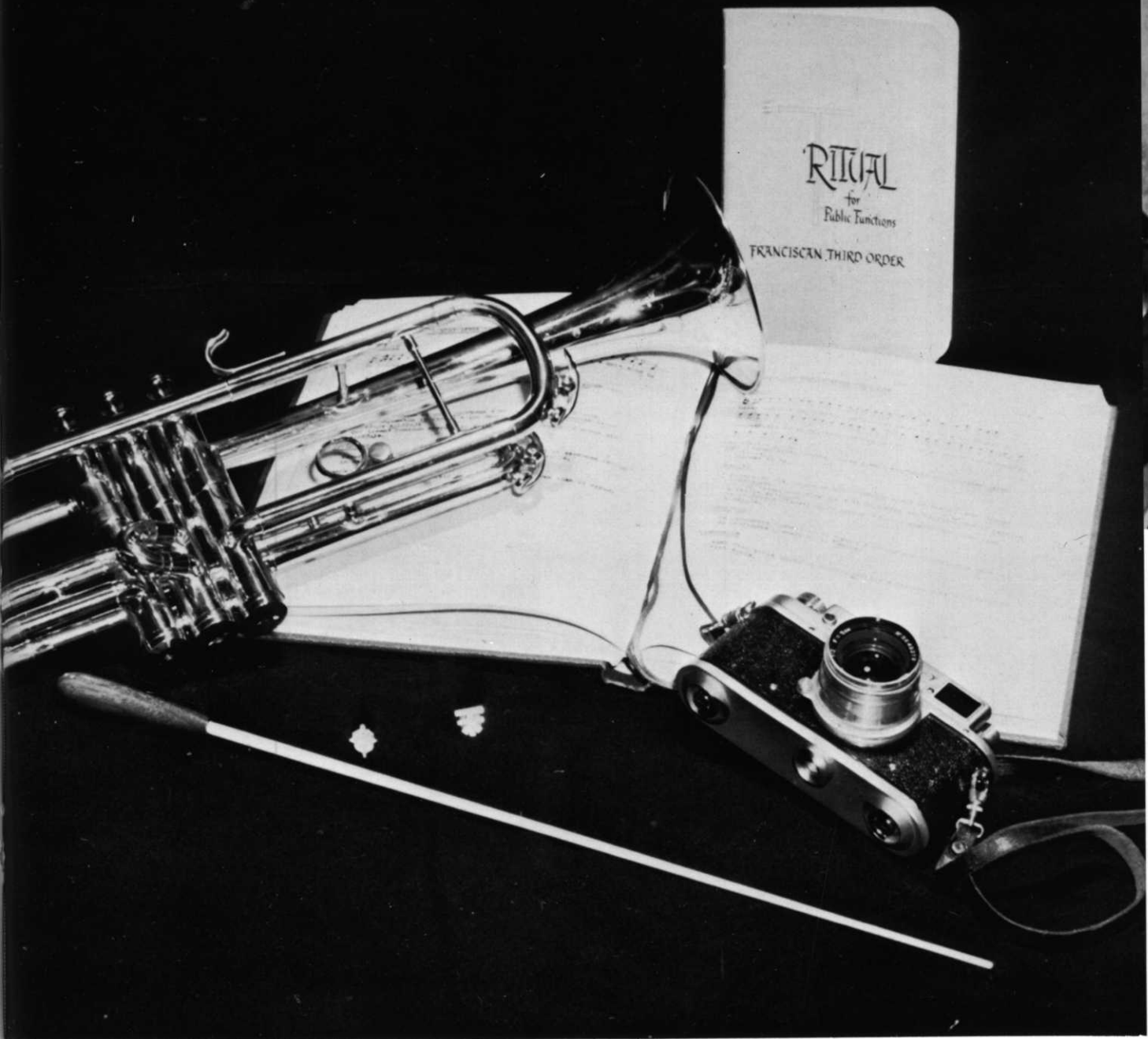

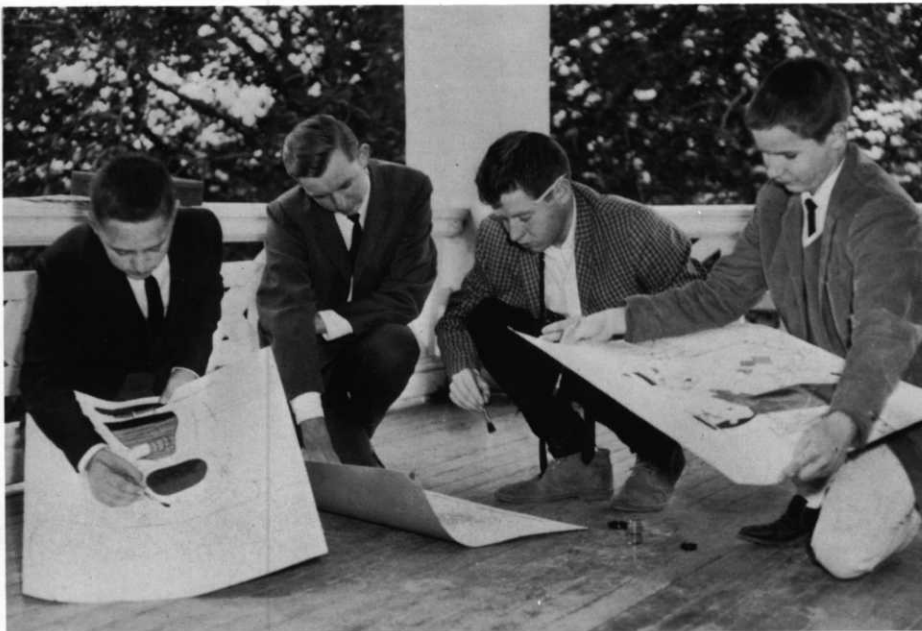

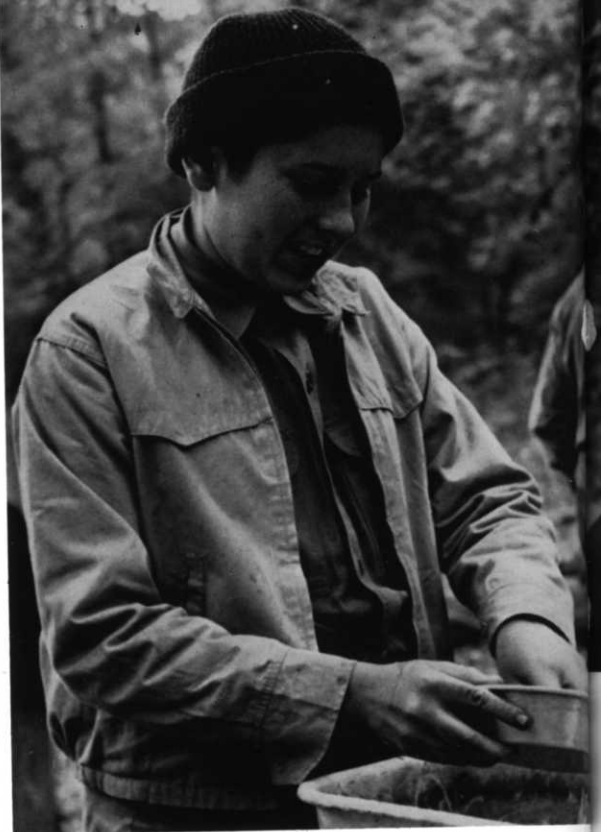

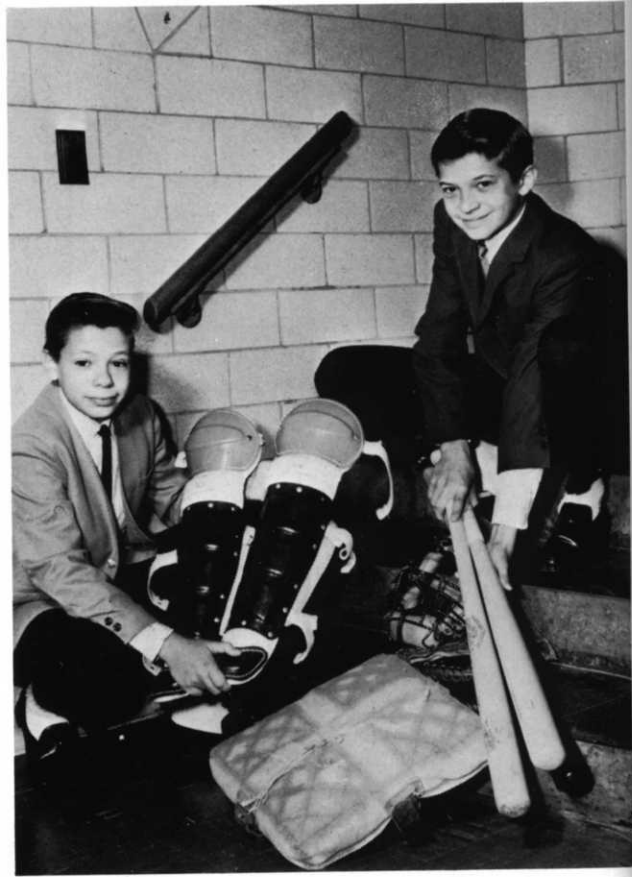

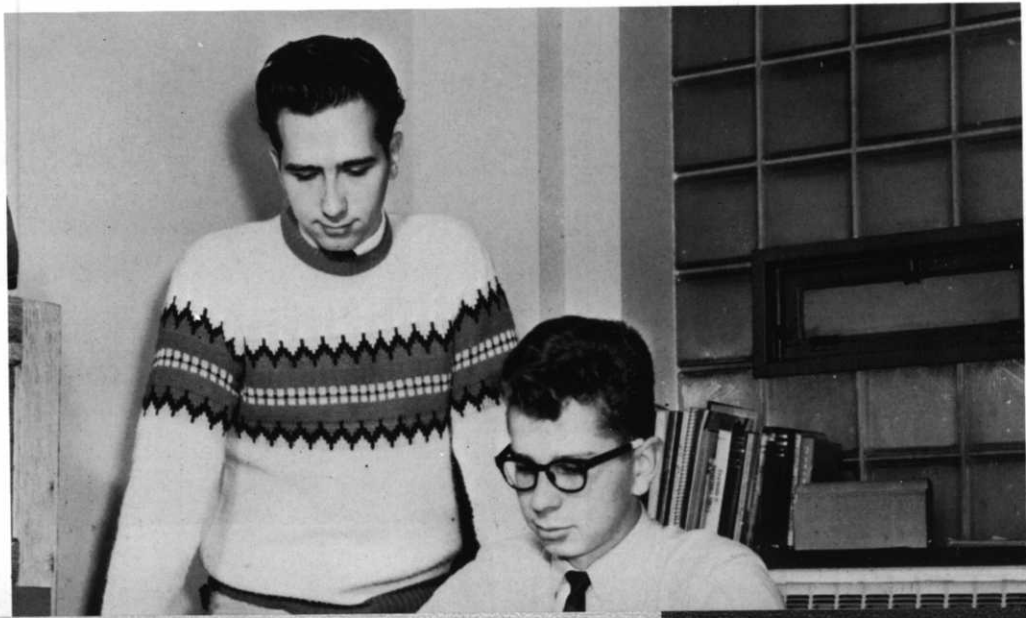

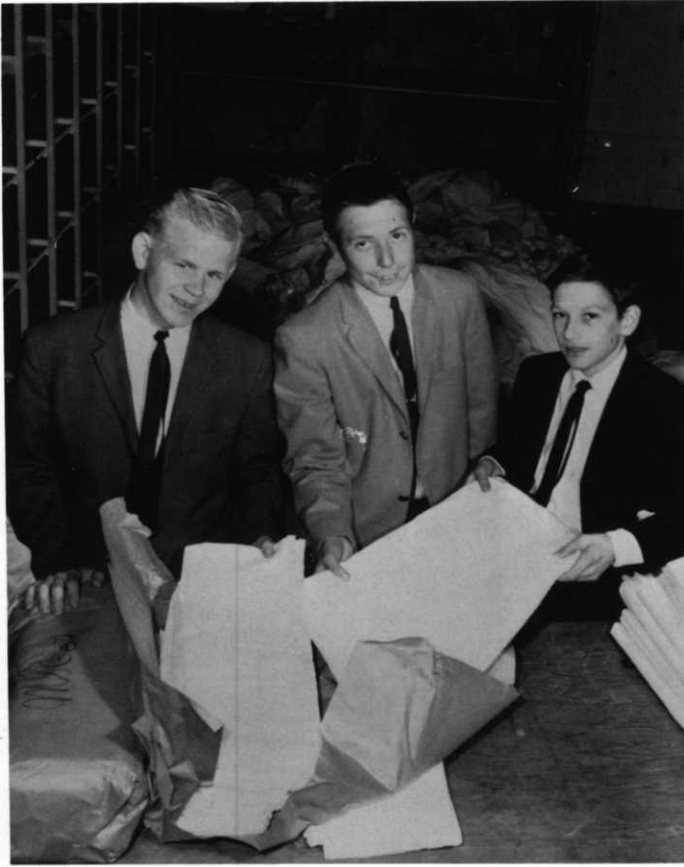

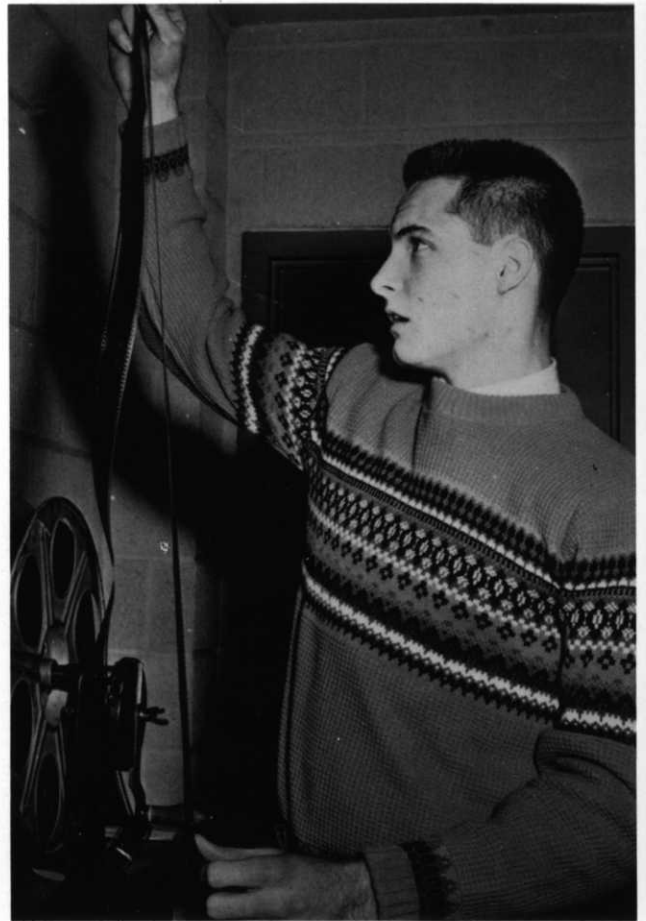

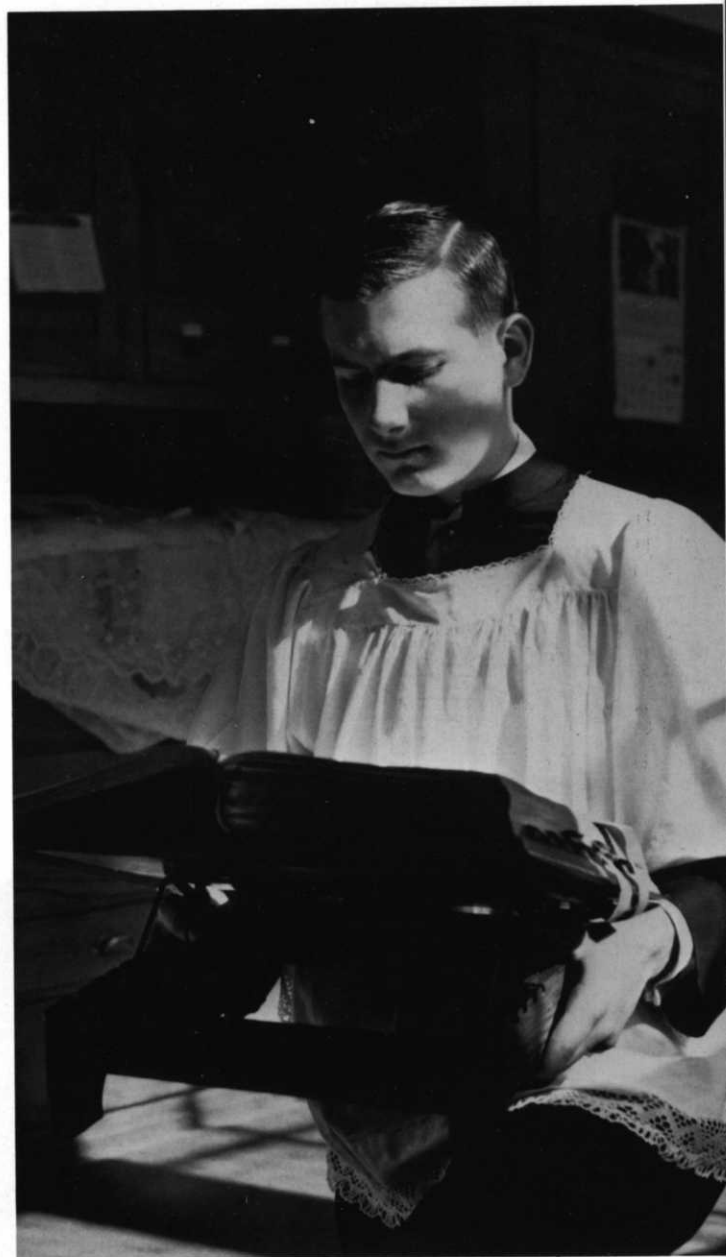

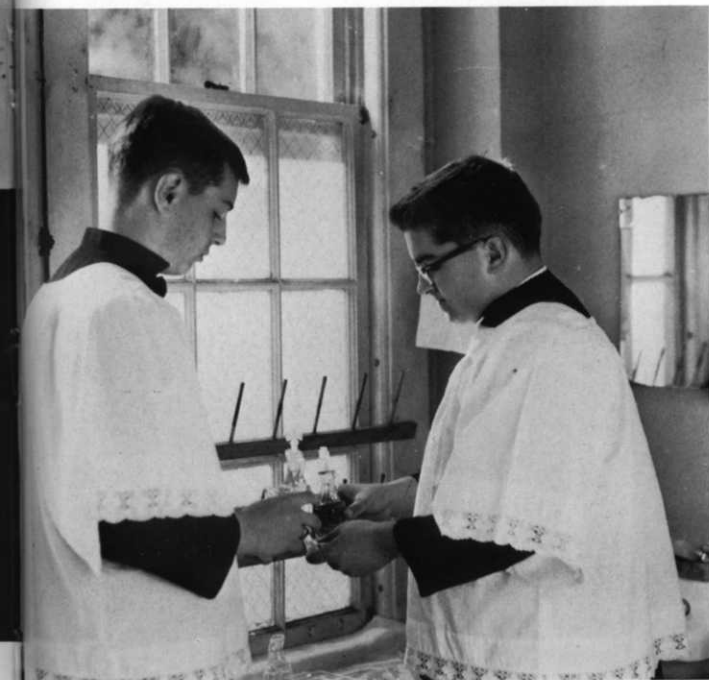

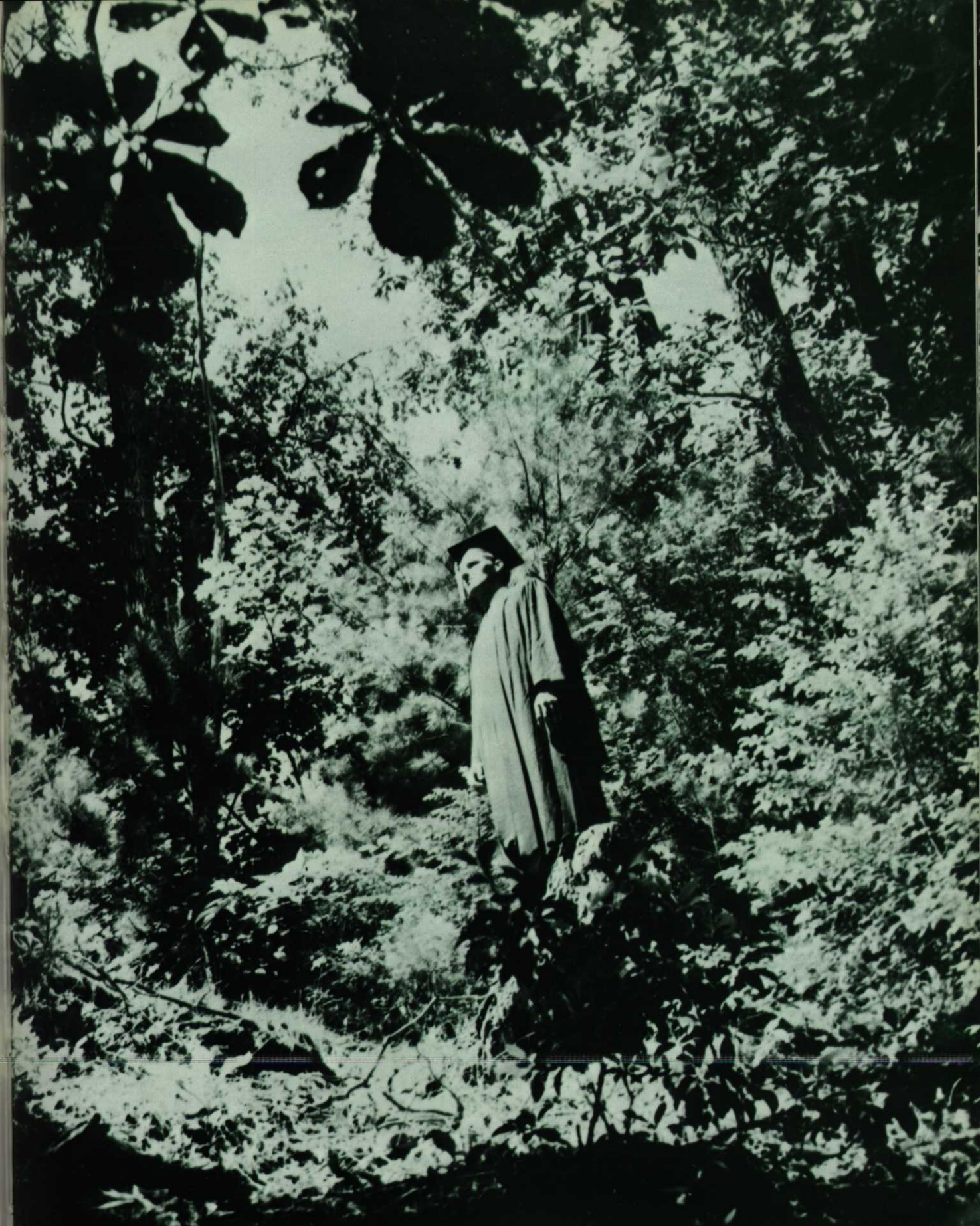

FR. HENRY AND FR. CHERUBIN OBSERVE 25th ANNIVERSARY

Fr. Henry Naparla, O.F.M. was born on April 23, 1914, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Father was enrolled at St. Bonaventure's in 1928 and after four years of study there entered Novitiate in Pulaski, Wis. One year later he was transferred to the House of Philosophy in Burlington, Wis., where in 1936, he pronounced his Solemn Vows. In 1937 he graduated from St. Francis College with a B.A. degree in Philosophy. After receiving Ordination in 1940, Fr. Henry was made curate of St. Mary's Church in Pulaski.

Father's teaching career began in 1941 and endures up to the present time. He taught Polish, Greek and French for eight years at St. Bonaventure's. In 1949 Father moved to St. Anthony's and became the pioneer Superior and also taught Polish and French during the years of 1949 and 1965. In 1952 when still stationed at Padua, Father received his Master of Arts degree at DePaul University and during the same year pursued studies in Spanish at Cornell University. The summers of 1953 and 1954 were spent in studies of advanced courses in French at Laval University in Quebec, Canada.

Father Henry again assumed the office of Superior in 1960 and was reappointed to the same office in 1963.

Father Cherubin Drag, O.F.M. was born in New Britain, Connecticut on March 9, 1911. At the age of fourteen Father took up stenographic and bookkeeping courses at Connecticut Business College for one year.

In 1928 he applied to St. Bonaventure's in Sturtevant, Wisconsin. Father Cherubin was part of Father Henry's class, so his education in the Order ran somewhat parallel with his classmates.

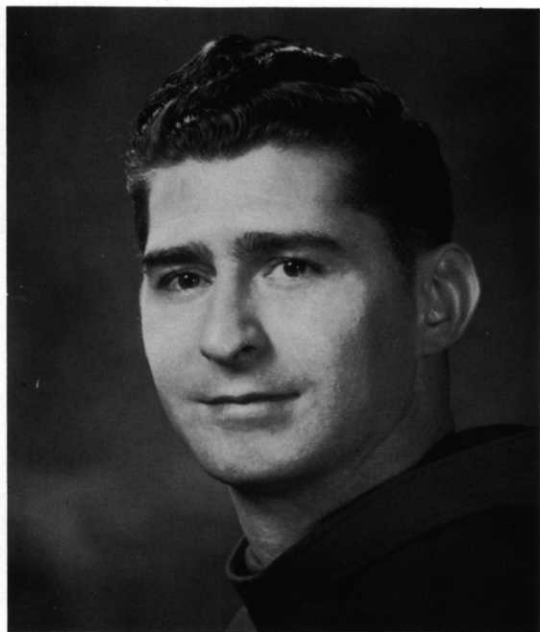
In 1940 Father was appointed the first Provincial librarian, and the first such in America. In 1942 Father held the position of Provincial Procurator, and ten years later he was made the first rector of St. Joseph School for Brothers in Pulaski. Father became in 1957 Rector of Christ the King Seminary in West Chicago.

In 1960 Father Cherubin returned to Pulaski for three years and in 1963 took over the duties of professor of Polish, religion, and typing at Padua, where Father also holds the position of School Registrar.

Then Father left us, following a transfer order by the Provincial. Seeing his ardent interest in all

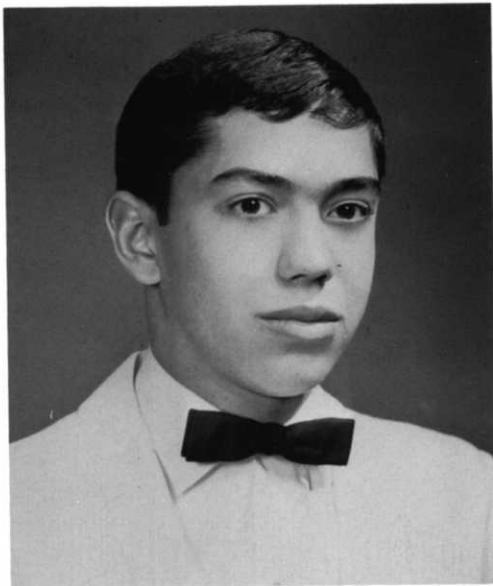
sports and in our class activities, we will never forget him.
