




Dedication


Fr. Emil Rakowski, O.F.M.


Fr. Roland Jaskulski, O.F.M.


Fr. Mel Baran, O.F.M.

Fr. Brendan Wroblewski, O.F.M.




Faculty Reflect Ideals of Christian Character


Fr. Cherubin Drag, O.F.M.


Fr. Reynold Jarecki, O.F.M.


Father Reynold is in his first year at Padua. Father has already become popular with the student body. He teaches chemistry, intermediate algebra and sophomore religion.




Fr. Placid Stroik, O.F.M.






Career Day





The ceremony closed with an exhortation by Fr. Cherubin to the Class of 1967 to always keep up the ideals that class rings commemorate.











Paduans captured three offices the highest being mayor won by Chris Franzese. Many new things were learned about politics and many new friends were made.


































Junior Varsity






















