
### GLEN INDUSTRIES OPEN

On June 11, 1979, Glen Industries, a sheltered workshop program of the Schuyler County Association for Retarded Children, opened at Padua. The program is located in the gym building and is expected to provide employment and training for mentally handicapped individuals. Although the program was operational since June, official dedication ceremonies did not take place until September 16. On that date, an open house was held for local community residents to view the program, even though many of the proposed renovations had not yet taken place.

Reginald Stanczyk. '67, has been working at Glen Industries as Vocational Evaluator, and was involved in much of the program's organization and set up. He was recently appointed Rehabilitation Co-ordinator for the agency. Through his efforts and the courtesy of Jim Wilson, Executive Director, arrangements have been made to have some activities of the 1979 reunion in the gym building.

## ALTERNATIVES EXPLORED FOR PADUA

On September 13, Rev. Austin Budnick received permission from the Provincial Board of the Assumption Province to begin work on the "Padua Alternatives Teaching-Learning Community". Fr. Austin has proposed establishing an alternatives education center for adults at Padua. The center, which would have a residential component, would seek to purchase Padua as a "community land trust". It is expected that actual useage of the complex will involve a wide range of human service programs including some with a focus on youth and on the handicapped and disadvantaged.

Although massive amounts of work remain to be done both in terms of implementing the proposal and on the buildings themselves, all concerned with the project are optimistic about its eventual success.
