FATHER TERRENCE LEAVES FOR MISSIONS

On Sunday, October 12th, a farewell banquet was held in Fr. Terrence Pinkowski's honor. This was the annual Jimmy Franzese Memorial Banquet held in his memory. Mr. Franzese was the well known and well liked basketball coach and physical education director of Padua High School before his tragic accident a few years ago.

Before the banquet began, Monsignor Joseph Balcerak of St.

Stanislaus parish in Rochester was the celebrant of the ceremonies in the student chapel, where he presented Fr. Terrence with his Mission Cross. The Monsignor then read the "Obedience" to Father Terrence from the Minister General of the Order. While the choir sang "Ave Maris Stella", Fr. Terrence was given the Pax Tecum by the members of the Friary. Following this, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament took place. After the completion of the chapel ceremonies, Father Terrence, who was the former moderator of the senior class of '59, and his guests were escorted by the seniors to the Friars' Refectory where they were served appetizers.

After this, they then gathered in the student's refectory, which was gaily decorated for the occasion, and here they were served a sumptuous meal prepared by the venerable Brothers.

Upon the completion of the meal Father Claude acted as Toastmaster for the evening, and introduced Louis Tarantelli, president of the senior class, as the first speaker of the evening. Tarantelli thanked Father Terrence for all that he had done for the seniors as moderator of their class, and especially for all he had done for the school.

Next, Mr. Arthur Richards, the prominent area reporter and good friend of Father Terrence, gave a short talk on the memories that Father Terrence will leave behind, and on behalf of the community of Watkins Glen wished him the best of luck in his new mission.

In the name of the community here at Padua, Father Timothy, the Superior of the Monastery, wished farewell and good luck to Father Terrence.

Father Claude then introduced Monsignor Balcerak as the next speaker. The Monsignor congratulated Father Terrence on the fine thing he was doing and the great sacrifice he was making. A check

5. Because as years go by it is natural for the alumni members to draw apart from one another, representatives were chosen who are to keep in closer contact with our alumni in the various sections of the East. Robert Killigrew was chosen to keep in touch with the alumni in and around the school itself; Thomas Tulko was chosen to take care of the N.Y.C. area; Conrad Olszewski the Buffalo, N. Y. area; Edward Brozek the N. J. area; and Joseph Kuchinski was to cover the Scranton area.

6. A committee was also chosen to take care of next year's meeting. The members of this committee are James Angelo '53, Joseph Kuchinski '54, Robert Malina '55, Thomas Tulko '56, and Walter Szczepaniak '58.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU

Summer is over and throughout the country the younger generation is returning to what is commonly referred to as the "old grind". Terrence Pinkowski, O.F.M. recently departed for the Philippines. These missionaries were not the first to do so nor will they be the last. Many more will follow in their footsteps.

Fr. Terrence Pinkowski spent seven years at Padua as a teacher of English Literature. He hails from Nanticoke, Pa., where he received his parochial school education. After four years at the public high school in that city he left for two years of college. He entered the novitiate at Pulaski, Wis., in 1941; he then went to Burlington, Wis., to study philosophy for three years. After leaving Burlington he had two years of Theological Study at Cedar Lake, Ind., and two years at Green Bay, Wis., where he was ordained on June 11, 1949. After being assigned to Saginaw, Mich., and Toledo, O., he was sent to Padua in February of 1951.

Father Terrence spent five years with us when his superiors gave him permission to attend St. Bonaventure University for one year, after which time he received his Master of Arts degree in Literature. He then resumed his work as teacher.

He leaves us now for the call of God is strong. He will long be remembered for his kindness and sincerity. He has loved us all and that is why we too love him. May God prosper his labors. God love you, Father Terrence.

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PADUA'S LIBRARY

In previous years nothing much was heard about the library, but today Padua's library has become one of the biggest student meeting places for study, research, and pleasure.

Growing by leaps and bounds, the library placed approximately 800 books at the disposal of the students last year, and it is expected that even more books will be added this year. PADUA-SAVONA 2-2 STALEMATE

As the first soccer game of the season got under way, the Padua Prepsters found themselves under mounted tension. Due to the early starting season, the "men in maroon" knew this was going to be a tough game, for they had very little pre-season practice.

In the first quarter, Savona's offense out-played Padua, and within minutes, Savona was ahead 2-0. The half ended with no further scoring.

With the opening of the third quarter, the Cascaders came back with a hard hitting offense. After a few minutes of constant driving, little Johnny Sowa scored a field goal, tying the score 2-2. Throughout the rest of the game, both teams fought vigorously, both offensively and defensively, but the game ended in a 2-2 deadlock.

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PREPSTERS TRAMPLE LAKEMONT ACADEMY

After tying Savona in its soccer opener, the Padua squad expected to have a tough time against Lakemont Academy. As a result, they practiced and drilled extensively until they mastered a number of plays. Their constant practice proved fruitful, because in their next game they emerged on top.

Only a few moments after the starting whistle, hustling Frankie Uss put the Cascaders ahead with a field goal. The Lakemont squad soon tied the score, but could do nothing to stop Padua's efficient penalty kicker, Walt Wnukowski. Wnukowski scored 4 out of 5 penalty kicks that afternoon.

The line played an extremely good game, out running and out playing the Lakemont team. Speedy ball playing kept the Prepsters on the offense a great deal of the time. Richie Uss sparked the backfield with a fine defensive and offensive game. Because of Padua's fast passing Lakemont was not able to initiate an effective offense of her own and the game ended with Padua ahead 6-3.

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PADUA DEFEATS HAMMONDSPORT 7-3

Going into the game with one win and one tie, the Padua eleven were determined to defeat Hammondsport High.

Stanley Grysko started off the scoring with a field goal in the first quarter. In the second quarter W. Wnukowski scored a penalty kick. Hammondsport was also successful in scoring, tying the game at 3-3 at the end of the third quarter. With the game at a 3-3 deadlock, the Prepsters started off the fourth quarter with new vigor and fight. Within a few minutes after the fourth quarter started, Frankie Uss scored an unassisted field goal. W. Wnukowski followed with another field goal assisted by Stanley Grysko. Padua continued to drive and the game ended with Padua in front 7-3.

CASCADERS EDGE SAVONA 1-0

After tying the Paduans in their first game, the Savona team was ready for another hard afternoon of soccer when they appeared at Padua for their second game. Richard Uss and Stanley Grysko, two Padua regulars, were out of the lineup for the day. During the first and second quarters of the game neither team had much of an opportunity to score. After a short recess and pep talk by the coach, Father Emil, the Cascaders were back on the field. Within a few minutes the tension was somewhat relieved when W. Wnukowski scored on a penalty kick. The game ended with Padua edging their visitors 1-0.

PADUA TIES CAMPBELL 0-0

Handicapped by a poor playing field and a noticeable lack of fighting spirit, the Cascaders were still able to eke out a tie against Campbell. It was largely a defensive uphill struggle for the Paduans that day. Fullbacks Joe Szczesniakowski and Tony Zembruzski were the busiest players on the field as they kept repelling the charging Campbell offense. Ted Krzciuk put his big, capable hands to use defending the Padua goal posts. The game ended in a scoreless tie.



PADUA NIPS NAPLES 2-0

It was a hard fought game, with both teams showing much spirit and good ball handling despite the wind. All who saw the game realized that both teams had been well drilled. The game remained at a stalemate until the last minute of the third quarter, when center-forward Stan Grysko, aided by Ken Joswick, was able to put Padua in the lead by scoring a field goal.

Although faced by a strong Naples offensive in the fourth quarter, the Prepsters were able to hold them down and walk off the field victorious, extending their winning streak to three games.

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Mr. Ralph Carroll holds Paduans spellbound

**RALPH CARROLL'S
LECTURE**

On the eve of October 11, 1958, the walls of the Padua gymnasium echoed with the mellow voice of Ralph Carroll, famed lecturer and television emcee of "Carroll's Caravan".

The evening opened with a short introduction, by Mr. Art Richards. Mr. Carroll then ingeniously opened his lecture by relating some of the humorous instances which occurred during the filming of his trip through the midwest. He then proceeded to show his film. During the film he had a tape recorder attached which put a wonderful touch to the lecture, as it played the music simultaneously with the characterizations of the film.

Mr. Carroll continued by showing us the films of his experiences in Oklahoma, bringing out the fact that in Oklahoma great care is being taken to preserve the history of the American Indian. Here the traditions and ceremonial dances of the Indian can be traced as far back as four thousand years.

In Colorado, he showed us scenes of Sante Fe, the second oldest city in the United States. Mr. Carroll spoke briefly of the formation of both the Grand Canyon and the petrified forest and then showed many breathtaking scenes in An-scochrome, the sponsor of his trip. This then brought an end to the first part of his lecture.
