Over 84 percent of us are very seriously concerned with what our future lives hold for us and 83 percent of us really have plans to meet the future by getting a higher education. That is, onethird of Padua's students have educational plans and one-half have vocational plans. Those with vocational plans will eventually need supplementary schooling or higher education. With that future in mind, it is quite evident why 96 percent of us really worry about doing well in studies. Incidentally, in a recent survey made by the Boy Scouts of America, nearly threefourths of the boys interviewed said that getting a higher education is their decision for the next few years.


