

"One at a time, I can only give the letters out one at a time", screams the poor frantic Senior who has charge of giving out the mail.


All the boys fill the refectory at the noon time meal and the gleam in their eyes shows one thought: "mail"

Casimir Klimas played for the first time in the third game of the season. Although he tends to stray from his position, he is one of the team's high scorers.


