The eleven old private rooms which held from two to five students have been changed into four long rooms and a new bathroom and will accommodate approximately 50 students when completed.

A totally new electrical system and a new tile floor were added. The new ceiling is made of acoustical (soundproof) tile.

This is the second in a series of major alterations that are being done on the dormitories and classrooms. The second floor classrooms were completely remodeled two years ago. After the completion of the third floor dorms, work is expected to start on the first floor classrooms

The new dorms will be ready for occupancy in a few weeks.
