After the meal a group of senior volunteers helped Father Maynard in taking the boys about the grounds. Each leader showed his group the classrooms, library, studyhall, recreational facilities and left them in the gym. Father Maynard took over here and gave them a spiritual conference.

BIG MOUTH, BIG MAN?

I do not want to appear to be on a soapbox to do some two-bit preaching. I want you to take a good look at yourself - a real good look - 'cause I'm going to put upon you, before I finish, one of the biggest responsibilities that anyone can place upon a teenager.

You know yourself that you can't blame this person too much, he doesn't know any better!

Now this one is a dilly! Here is a guy who in order to be a member of some gang, has to be Mr. Big! So here comes Mr. Big who says to himself "here is a bunch of guys I gotta show who's big cheese". Naturally he tries to make an impression of being a "tough guy". The other characters look up to him because he "knows how to handle himself". Does he really?

Still here is another example:

Here is a boy who has a nice girl . He thinks he can make a better impression on her if he uses vile language. After a few dates, she gives him the brushoff, and he wonders why!

I'm going to emphasize something most of you know and realize. If you want to have friends, use clean language. Show them, though they be indifferent to what you think, that you are a gentleman. Let your actions speak for themselves.

If any of you feel offended, that's too bad, for I speak the truth. If the shoe fits, you'll just have to wear it.


