

Students Elect Council Members

During the past two weeks the student body elected the officers and representatives of its first Student Council. The Council officers for this school year are: John Drexler, president; Edward Walczak, vice president; Henry Butka, treasurer; and Byron Nied, secretary.

At the first Council meeting, held on October 26, the representatives elected Fr. Cajetan moderator by unanimous vote. It was also decided to have meetings at 12:30 on every other Wednesday. The meetings will be open unless otherwise specified.

SENIORS TAKE MARATHON

The traditional Halloween Marathon was held on Wednesday, Oct. 31. The races were conducted under the supervision of Fr. Emil, Fr. Bertrand, Fr. Antonine, and Coach Lemak.

The contests were mostly of the novelty type and consisted of the following: human obstacle, weaving crawl under, one leg relay, dizzy-izzy, Siamese twin relay, kangaroo jump, brick walking race, caterpillar race, standing broad jump, pony express, jump stick relay, ping-pong relay, hand grasp relay, wheelbarrow race, and the cross country race.

Although the seniors placed third in the cross country race, which was won by Pete Krafinski, they placed first or second in many other races. The final tallying found the seniors on top with 36 points closely followed by the juniors with 29. The sophomores placed third and the freshmen last. Again the freshmen were divided into A and B classes in order to give them a better chance against the more experienced upperclassmen, but this didn't help them much.

The day ended with an outdoor barbecue and a movie.

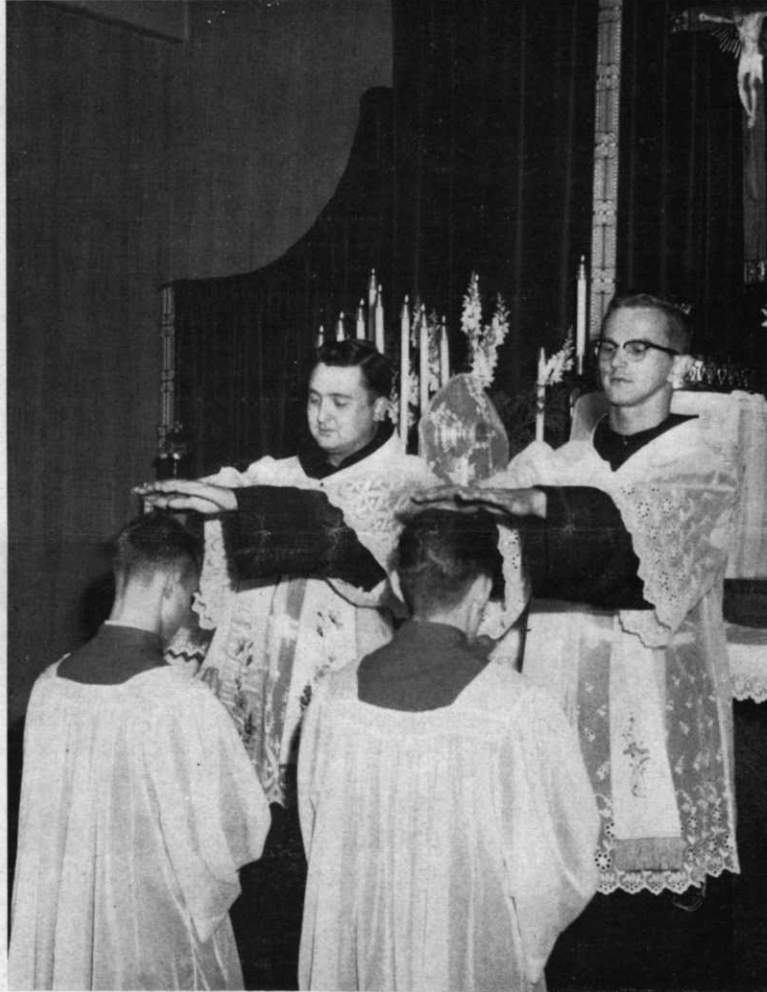

Other speakers included Tom Tulko '56, who spoke on a career in physics; Joe Flis '60, who spoke about pre-med school; Ronald Gajewski '58, who spoke about careers in psychology; and John Demski '60, who spoke of banking. A question-answer period followed the lectures.

In the afternoon the alumni demonstrated their skill in volley ball and in the evening the students witnessed the alumni basketball game in which the older alumni competed against the younger ones. The game was full of excitement and fun as the older alumni won the game by a score of 62 to 53.

FACULTY PROFILE

Hyacinth advanced to the position of Rector, which he has held for three years, and in these years the school has taken on a new look with the remodeling of the dormitories and other main sections.

Besides his important role as Rector, Father is a professor of Latin, and an excellent counselor, always willing to help anyone with a problem.

We will always reserve a place in our hearts for him as an expression of our deepest gratitude for all that he has done for us in our spiritual and physical life.

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM LOSES FINAL MEET

The Rochester Diocesan Catholic meet, held on November 3rd on Padua's 2.3 mile course, brought an end to the Cascaders' Cross Country season. The race, which was run on a cold, overcast day was won by a powerful McQuaid High School team of Rochester which scored 21 points. Aquinas Institute, also of Rochester, placed second with 35 points, while Padua came in third scoring 67 points. The McQuaid team was led to victory by a runner who broke Padua's old Cross Country course record and set a new one with a blazing time of 11:02. The first three Cascaders to cross the finish line were as follows: Richard Bonk, seventh; Peter Krafinski, ninth; and Steve Smolenski, eleventh.

This year, along with a varsity race, there was also a freshman Cross Country team meet. The team was assembled and coached by Fr. Emil who put together a fairly good squad of runners as was seen at the Cross Country meet. The frosh team ran against other freshman teams including a newly formed team from Bishop Kearney High School of Rochester. Although the freshmen finished third out of 4 participating teams, they put on an impressive showing while gaining valuable experience. Ed Hyland and Stan Jessie, who finished fifth and eighth respectively in the 1.5 mile race, put on a good showing as future varsity prospects.

BASKETBALL SEASON RETURNS

November 1st brought the 1962-63 basketball season to a long awaited start. With only one starter returning from last year's junior varsity team, Fr. Emil has a tremendous rebuilding job ahead of him. A large number of boys came out for tryouts, which were held on November 1st, but after a week of activity the team has been cut down to 13 members.

The varsity is expected to find itself on top in the won-lost column. If the boys play up to their capacity this will not be too hard to achieve. With last year's starting five returning the team has the makings of a good season, namely: experience, fair height and good speed. This year's starters, Den Springer, Hank Bitka, Stan Czarnecki, Rich Kvedrovicz and Bob Recotta are being counted upon to bring Padua's varsity a winning season.

RUNNERS DEFEATED IN OPENING MEET

Steve Smolenski was the second Padua runner to cross the finish line with Ed Sudol third.

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM WINS

In its best showing of the season Padua's Cross Country team beat both Addison and Odessa in a meet on Padua's 2.3 mile course. The entire team showed an evident desire to win by running hard and fast. First man across the finish line was Richard Bonk with a time of 13:06. Peter Krafinski took second place with 13:07. The score of the meet was as follows: Padua 31, Odessa 39, and Addison 45.

INTRAMURAL NEWS

This year, as every year, the first intramural sport on the athletic agenda is soccer. All Paduans except those on any present varsity sport are participating in the intramural program. The intramural teams were chosen under the supervision of Fr. Emil and are coached by varsity team members, who also referee the games.

After the choosing of teams, the games were quickly moving along under the direction of John Tulko and Jack Drexler. This year there is more competition among the teams which makes playing more interesting. The fight for first place is very tight and it is hard to say just which team will emerge as league victors.

SOCCER TEAM DOWNED IN OPENER

The opening game of the '62 soccer season brought the Cascaders an eight to three defeat by Campbell. The Cascaders played top notch soccer in the first quarter of the game continually keeping the ball on the opponents' side of the field. The Cascaders, however, did not take advantage of scoring opportunities and were held scoreless in the first quarter. Campbell took an early second quarter lead by scoring a goal, but a penalty kick by Bobby Szygula narrowed the score 2-1. Dennis Springer then booted in a goal which brought Padua a 3-2 lead. Unfortunately, that was all the scoring to be done by the Cascaders.

A weak backfield and poor kicking on the part of Padua enabled Campbell to dominate the second half and score three more goals to defeat the Cascaders 8-3.

PADUA DOWNS CAMPBELL

Padua picked up its first win in four starts when it beat Campbell H.S. in their return match. Good defense on the part of the backfield was the main reason for keeping Campbell from scoring. Fr. Emil rotated the players from backfield to line trying to get an offense rolling. Padua's lone tally came in the fourth quarter when a hand ball was called on a Campbell player and the Cascaders took advantage by scoring on the penalty kick. Final score of the game was 1-0.

ADDISON STOPS PADUA

The Cascaders traveled to Addison for the second game of the soccer season. It was a hard fought game and no goals were scored until late in the second quarter when the Addison team hit for two points. Addison scored again in the third and fourth quarters while a goal by Den Springer in the third quarter was Padua's only goal. Lack of experience was again evident in the backfield as the Cascaders were turned back by Addison by a score of 6-2.

CASCADERS LOSE TO ELKLAND

The Elkland team toppled the Cascaders 6-2 in the third game of the season. Elkland scored first in the game with a goal in the closing seconds of the first quarter. Gene Exley tied the score for Padua in the second quarter with a twenty yard boot that hit the net for two points. Elkland, wasting no time in the third quarter, scored two quick goals to take the lead. The remainder of the game, though it was played hard by both teams, was scoreless leaving the Cascaders with another defeat as the buzzer sounded.

HAMMONDSPORT TROUNCES PADUA

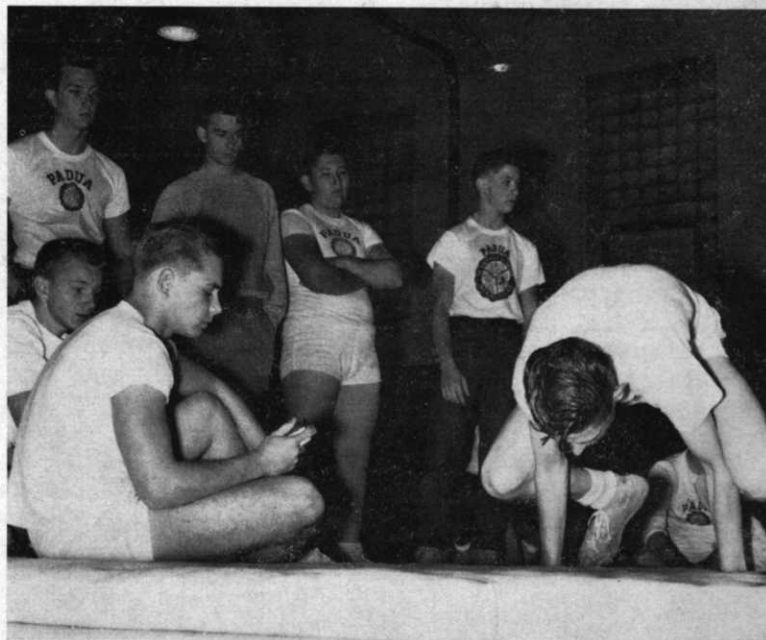
