ALUMNI PRESIDENT NAMED TO IMPORTANT POST

Mr. Frank Czajkowski, president of St. Anthony of Padua Alumni Association, was appointed Deputy Clerk of the Foreign Claims Settlement Commission in Washington, D. C. on June 18, 1962. Mr. Czajkowski, a resident of Brooklyn, N. Y., is married and the father of three children. Prior to his appointment, he was actively engaged VOL. 14, No. 2 in the private practice of law.

In addition to his duties as Deputy Clerk, Mr. Czajkowski will serve as a staff attorney on the Polish Program presently being administered by the Commission. That program, the largest single claims program administered by it to date, is designed to compensate American nationals for property confiscated by Poland which has agreed to pay \$40 million in settlement of approximately 10,000 claims which have been filed with the Commission. A graduate of St. John's University College, St. John's Law School of Brooklyn and St. Anthony of Padua, Watkins Glen, N. Y., Mr. Czajkowski's special knowledge of the Polish language and history will be of special value to the Commission in that program.

The words of the song are: (Chorus)


Marching along we're singing our song


