



FACULTY PROFILE FR. TERRENCE PINKOWSKI, o.f.m.

Father Terrence entered the Franciscan Novitiate in 1941, at Pulaski, Wis. He studied at the House of Philosophy in Burlington, Wis. for three years, after which he went on to study Theology for two years at Cedar Lake, Ind., and another two years in Green Bay, Wis. He was ordained on June 11, 1949 - the start of a noble and unselfish career. His first assignment was at Saginaw, Mich, after which he went to Toledo, Ohio and then to Padua in '51. In 1956 he was granted permission to study at St. Bonaventure University where he received a Master of Arts Degree in English.

Fr. Terrence felt that a more noble cause awaited him in the Philippines, so he started out for what would be one of the greatest and most satisfying jobs given to priests, helping the poor and the uneducated who wanted to find peace and security in God. A few months ago Fr. Terrence returned from the Philippine Missions to Padua.


CHRISTMAS PARTY
