STUDENT COUNCIL ELECTIONS

For the elections to the Student Council, the senior class chose Joseph Jurewicz and Alan Costich as candidates for the presidency. In the vote, excluding freshmen, Jurewicz defeated Costich 39 to 34. Alan Costich was then eligible for the vice presidency. The other candidate was the president of the senior class, Thomas Malina. Alan Costich edged out Tom Malina by two votes, 38-36.

This year the council hopes to achieve more than it has done in the past, facing more crises than ever, because of many changes in the school. As of yet there has been no mention about the other two offices, namely, secretary and treasurer, but as the council progresses, we hope that worthy students will take the offices they deserve.

A MOVEMENT FOR IMPROVEMENT

A few years ago when one visited the main building at Padua, it was evident that much improvement was needed. The dormitories had an ancient look and the beds were quite uncomfortable. Dramatic changes began to happen in the way of improvements.

During the 1962-63 school year the sophomore and junior dormitories were completely rebuilt and furnished with spacious closets and Hollywood beds. The following year, a large third floor washroom was put in containing ten large lavatories. Also on the third floor, music rooms were built and furnished tastefully. They consist of six rooms where the school musicians may practice and receive lessons from Father Brendan. On the main floor of the building, the walls were reinforced and a sound proof ceiling installed. The offices of the Rector and the Bursar were completely rebuilt and the students' refectory and front portico were repainted. During the summer of 1964, the freshman dormitories were repainted and new beds were supplied. During the 1964-65 school year, the infirmary was completely remodeled. New walls were constructed, housing new insulation and a new ceiling installed. Work was also started on improving the roof and the outside parts of the building.

As the students began this new semester, a new shower room was at their disposal. Located on the third floor, it is the newest change up to date. While the shower rooms were being added, a new project was begun in the gym. A crew of workmen gave our pool tables a great workover. New cushions were installed and a new cover also. Along with the remodeled tables came new pool sticks and two sets of balls. And so, through the efforts of the Fathers, and Brothers and our school carpenter, the Padua school building of today is a far cry from what it was just three short years ago.

THOMAS WOJSLAWOWICZ
CLASS OF 1960

The Mount Carmel Lyceum wishes to nominate for the Bayonne Junior Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Service Award, Mr. Thomas K. Wojslawowicz. Mr. Wojslawowicz is a young man dedicated to the youth and service of the community. He is a graduate of Seton Hall University possessing a B.S. degree in Education, having majored in Health and Physical Education.

Mr. Wojslawowicz is a fourth grade teacher in Our Lady of Mount Carmel School and a part-time program director for the Industrial Y.M.C.A. At Mt. Carmel School, he was instrumental in formulating plans for a much needed physical education program, scheduled to start with the fall term.

His many talents came into view as the program secretary for the local Y.M.C.A. Here, he was chiefly responsible for all youth activities. He introduced the youth to gymnastics by organizing a gym team at the "Y" for boys 8 to 14 years of age. The team under his direction, participated in the Bayonne Day program at the World's Fair. He coached the Boys' Competitive Swim Team, which competed in the New Jersey "Y" Swim League.

Seeing the need for more activities for girls, Mr. Wojslawowicz organized and coached the successful Bayonne "Y" Mermaids. The team practices four times a week and is one of the few competitive activities for girls on a community basis. The team is open to all girls in the city between the ages of seven to seventeen. The team is in its initial season and is already being looked upon as a sure bet for league honors.

Mr. Wojslawowicz has also directed the annual Learn-to-Swim Campaign held at the "Y", which offers to all the youth of Bayonne the opportunity to learn to swim.

To help bring a halt to the juvenile problems in the city, Mr. Wojslawowicz reorganized the Teen-Age Club

in Bayonne. This club provided the opportunity for the city's teenagers to become engaged in wholesome activities and to stop "hanging out on the street corners and getting into trouble." He serves as the club's advisor.

He assisted the National Conference of Christians and Jews in its annual Brotherhood week project by helping to plan its youth program.

Bayonne High School turned to Mr. Wojslawowicz when it was formulating its after-school athletic program. He serves as the volunteer-instructor for the girls' tumbling squad.

Mr. Wojslawowicz directed the Youth Division for the Bayonne Chapter of the American Cancer Fund. In this capacity, he was responsible for co-ordinating all the youth activities for this worthwhile cause.

Mr. Wojslawowicz is a member of the Mt. Carmel Lyceum and serves on its athletic committee and the Knights of Columbus. He serves on the Metropolitan Swim Committee and on the N. J. Y.M. - Y.W.C.A. Girls' Swim Committee. He is an active member of the American and New Jersey Association for Health, Education, and Recreation and the National Council on Physical Education. He is a Divisional Secretary-Treasurer of the N. J. "Y" Boys' Swim League and a member of the Executive Committee of the N. J. Boys' Swim League.
