JUNIORS PARTICIPATE IN YOUTH COUNTY

This year's Junior Class eagerly awaited the opening of the 1966 Youth County. Sponsored by the Schuyler County American Legion, it is an annual experiment in the study of government on the local level. Along with about 100 other students from Odessa, Watkins Glen, and St. John's Minor Seminary, the twenty members of the Class of 1967 attended the exercise which was held in the American Legion hall on Franklin street. The program began Thursday afternoon, Feb. 17, and continued to Friday.

For the first few minutes, everything was confusion as we tried to orientate ourselves and get acquainted with the other students present. When things finally settled down, we learned several things. First, we learned that there were three main political divisions. The Nationalists and the Federalists were organized political parties, while the Independents could choose either party and vote accordingly. The second thing we learned was that there were six geographical divisions in Youth County. The largest, and the one which encompassed all the others was, naturally, the county. Next was Garden City, which in turn was subdivided into wards. There were two smaller towns, Riverdale and Greenhill and two villages, North Haven and Studentville.

We split up, each going to the area allotted to his respective locality. With Boys' State representatives as counselors, we proceeded to nominate the candidates for office in the village, town, ward and city. Here Padua was well represented, having candidates for a wide variety of posts.

Friday's activities began at 9:00 a.m. when a resume of the preceding day's activity was given. We then divided up into two groups, Nation-
