

PADUA COPS LAKES REGION CHAMPIONSHIP BUT LOSES IN DIOCESAN TOURNAMENT

A superb defense and good shooting boosted Padua over Romulus and into the Lakes Region championship. The victory gave Padua a 15-3 record, the finest in the history of the school. The Cascaders started off slowly as Romulus took a 16-13 lead after eight minutes of play. By the time the first half ended however, Bruce Ike, the league's leading scorer hit for ten points. In the second half Rich Stoklosa held Ike to only 5 points and Joe Jurewicz and Cliff Swirski got hot to give Padua a 48-35 lead at the end of three quarters. The Cascaders kept shooting well and at the final buzzer the score was Padua 62. Romulus 51. Joe Jurewicz was high scorer with 24 points, and Cliff Swirski had 18.
