STUDENT COUNCIL **NEWS**

The Student Council will soon be operating at Padua for its fourth year. Although still in its infancy, problems plagued it from the start. Lack of effectiveness, influence, and student participation are some of the growing pains the young organization has had to endure.

This year the Student Council has a new moderator, Fr. Gabriel Rosetti. In order to learn some of his intentions, an interview was arranged. Two candidates for Student Council President were also present. In addition to getting his views, we also hoped to have these candidates Roger Hetel and John Mlynarski express their views so that the election will not be just a popularity contest, but will be done on "a best man for the job" basis.

During this discussion, held recently, one idea kept coming up. Cooperation on everyone's part was emphasized, so that more could be accomplished this year than ever be-

Asked for a broad statement of policy. Fr. Gabriel said that, in general, the Student Council will seek to follow all the purposes and procedures outlined in the constitution and, if necessary, the constitution may be revised. "The student body is our concern. It will be our job to inform and represent them fully".

Question: There have been complaints that the present system of representation is inadequate. What are your feelings on changing the system, perhaps going into something similar to Congress, with each class having a set number of "senators" and a number of "representatives".


