



How can money, purpose and interest stop education? We don't know what the exact answer is but these are the reasons why Padua is closing.

It was decided in Wisconsin by 52 Franciscan Friars, some of whom have never seen nor visited Padua, and yet it is closing. The students, faculty and parents had little to say.

Although it was decided to close, an effort to keep Padua going is being initiated by Fr. Austin. His proposed plan is to double the tuition from \$800 to \$1600 to pay for the cost of lay instructors to teach at Padua if it stays open. This is being done because of the need of priests to teach at Padua. There aren't enough to go around. In our opinion money should be second to education. Fr. Austin should (we hope) succeed in his new proposal.

If his proposal is not accepted, then Padua might become the home of F.I.G.H.T., or a school for the children of migrant workers or maybe both. F.I.G.H.T. is means, Freedom, Independence, God, Honor, Today, and it helps the underprivileged of Rochester to receive an education. These are only two possibilities thought about and will be decided on in the future, if Padua closes.
