Introducing a new custom this year, the annual retreat was conducted from Sept. 16th to the 18th, at the beginning of the school year, instead of January, as in former years. Father Fabian Czajkowski, OFM, of Grand Rapids, Michigan, conducted the retreat for the student body.

Many years of experience helped in the formation of a sound and effective retreat program as was seen in the daily conferences conducted by Father Fabian. His topics dealt with many problems of youths' spiritual life and were well discussed, including refutation and explanation of some of the common pitfalls. The lives of some saints were referred to insofar as that particular saint was a shining example to youth. As a constant reminder of good Christian behavior, the retreat master suggested that we keep in mind the motto of St. John Bosco, "Have fun, but do not sin." As a supplement to this, he stressed the life of Blessed Dominic Savio, the boy saint guiding principle, "Death rather than sin."
