He explained how according to reason and the teachings of the Church Mary deserves this title and is, indeed, everything it implies. In the evening the novena devotions in honor of the Immaculate Conception were held, and afterwards the Third Order members received the Papal blessing.

#### CASCADERS TOP DUNDEE 63-50 IN OPENER


