## TWENTY-ONE TO RECEIVE DIPLOMAS

### Juniors Attend Youth Co. Affair

"Youth County", sponsored by the American Legion in Watkins Glen, held its second annual session on May 21-22. The junior classes from Watkins and Odessa Central schools, along with Sr. John's and Padua made up the population of 11. The purpose of this program was to acquaint the youth of Schuyler County with the functioning processes of county government and to instill within them the principles of good citizenship.

First on the agenda was the issuing of the respective emblems which divided the members into three parties: Federalists, Nationalists, and Independents. The young citizens next gathered in the assembly room where Mr. Henry Valente, chairman of the affair, delivered an introductory welcoming address and presented a resume of things to come. Mrs. Lolita Cass, the first woman mayor in Watkins, also delivered a brief discourse, mentioning why we should be proud to live in America and to take active part in our government. She also stressed the educational advantages of participating enthusiastically in "Youth County."

The nomination of the town and village officers ensued. This was followed by the election of chairmen to present the respective party platforms the following day.

Next morning, proceedings were renewed with the nominations for county offices, accompanied by short introductory speeches by the candidates. After a brief luncheon, the party platforms were delivered by the Federalist chairman, John Knorowski of Padua and the Nationalist chairman, Thomas Gallagher of St. John's.

General elections for county, town and village officers were then held. In the time allotted for counting votes, Mr. Valente suggested some voluntary entertainment. In that interval, several students exposed their hidden talents for the enjoyment of all.

## CASCADERS CONCLUDE LOSING SEASON

Composed of mostly young and unexperienced ballplayers, the Cascader nine was able to post only a 3-7 record.

Capitalizing on a last inning error, the Cascaders managed to register a 3-2 decision over Dundee. Len Murawski started on the hill for Padua, but was relieved by Bob Bahara who received credit for the victory.

Although the Cascaders were able to grab an early 4-1 lead, they found themselves on the short end of an 8-4 count as they played host to Waverly. Ron Gajewski did a creditable job for four innings but lacked the support of his fielders. Waverly's hitters then jumped on reliever Len Murawski for five runs over the last three frames.

C.F.A. avenged a previous defeat at the hands of the Cascaders by posting a hard fought 3-2 victory. The Padua club had the bases loaded with one out in the seventh when Ron Gajewski lined into a double play. Bob Bahara, who went the route for the Cascaders, took the loss.

Wet grounds and a constant drizzle forced Padua's home game with Watkins Glen to be played at the fairgrounds. With Bahara and Murawski alternating on the mound, the Paduans were able to hold their rivals to one run over the first four innings. In the sixth inning the Glen nine put together two hits for a tally which gave them a 2-1 win.

In their final outing of the season the Cascaders lost another heartbreaking one run decision to Notre Dame 5-4. The Cascaders shelled Notre Dame starter Dick Crossed with a three run rally in the fourth. The temporary lead soon vanished as the Crusaders tallied single markers in the sixth and seventh innings for the victory.
