Be it the priesthood or the professions, your success or failure will largely depend on how you spent your days of study in high school.

RESPECT AND REVERENCE

Reverence and respect are truly golden virtues. However, these virtues seem to have been lacking too frequently in our day

It is a negligence which has developed insidiously. This attitude is seemingly gained without full cognizance of its demoralizing effects.

A priest should be regarded with awe and respect. He is a mediator between God and man, a self sacrificing individual who has given his all to serve God.

If a priest chooses to bee too distant, he loses the necessary trust that the lay people must confide in him. No one will confide in him, at least not with the effective thoroughness accompanied by complete trust, because he seems to be too far away to really help. On the other hand if a priest becomes too friendly, he is usually taken for granted. Because a priest is always near we are forgetting his necessity. We do not stop to think of our plight if a priest could not be found.

The main problem is that we frequently overlook the dignity of the priesthood simply because a priest talks to us in a friendly manner. We do not take into consideration the honor and sublime position of the priest.

Cardinal Newman in one of his compositions had this to say of a gentleman: "He is one who can recollect to whom he is speaking."

This quotation serves to emphasize the point in discussion. If we desire to be true Catholic gentlemen, we must observe the rule characterized in the excerpt. We must bear in mind the dignity and sublimity of the priesthood at all times. It is our duty as Christians to show the same amount of reverence towards the priest as we would show towards Christ Himself.
